The Park Department announces the completion and opening to the public on Christmas Day of a new playground at Onderdonck Avenue between Starr Street and Willowhyby Avenue, as a Yuletide present to the youngsters in the Ridgewood section of Queens.

This is ione of several recreation areas started in 1940 and left in various stages of incompletion when the W.P.A. was abolished in 1942. It will provide urgently needed recreational facilities for the adjacent residents of various ages.

The nine tenths of an acre, rectangular shaped plot, entirely enclosed with fencing to protect the youngsters and bordered with shade trees, is divided into three separate sections to facilitate control. One area contains a send pit, shower basin, kindergarten swings, slides and see-saws for pre-school children; another contains larger slides, swings and handball courts for older children; and the third contains two basketball courts and a large asphaltic concrete surfaced area for group games, roller skating and ice skating when sub-freezing temperatures permit.

Numerous benches have been provided for the users of the facility as well as for purents and guardiens of children. There are also a drinking fountain, flag pole and comfort station.

With the addition of this new area, there are now 501 playgrounds in the City park system.

A special program of marionette and magic shows has been planned by the Department of Parks for the Christmas holidays. The shows will be given from December 26th to January 3rd at the Park Department's indoor playhouse at the Amphitheatre, East River Drive at Grand Street in Manhattan. The shows are for children only, and admission is free. Morning performances will start at 10:00 A.M. and afternoon shows at 2:00 P.M.

At each performance the children will be treated to magical tricks, songs, stunts and games by Peter Pan the Magic Man, helped by his furry, white assistant, Oscar the Rabbit, and a full marionette show by the Park Department Marionette Theatre troupe. Four marionette dramas, selected because of their popularity with young audiences of the trailer marionette theatre, have been chosen for presentation. The shows are The Shoemaker and the Elves, Happy the Humbug, Jack and the Beanstalk, and Hansel and Gretel.

This year's display comprises over 1000 colorful Poinsettia plants in three varieties, white, pink and red; some of the Poinsttias measure 12 to 15 inches in diameter. Other flowering plants such as the attractive and well known Cyclamen and Camelias, have been grouped with the Poinsettias.

The exhibit will be open every day from 10:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. starting Sunday, December 21, 1947 to January 2, 1948.

When the Hon. Vincent R. Impellitteri, President of the City Council, and Acting Mayor, throws the switch at City Hall at 5:25 P.M., Thursday, December 18th, lighting the sixty-foot high tree, he will also light a decorative scene depicting the Three Wise Men proceeding to the Star in the East, centered in a traditional red and green wreath, the largest outdoor wreath in the City of New York.

This mammoth wreath, eighteen feet in diameter, has been erected over the main entrance of the Park Department Headquarters at the Arsenal, 64th Street and Fifth Avenue, Central Park, New York, a Christmas welcome to the visitors in the park.

In keeping with the holiday spirit, Park Department gardeners made the wreath by ingenious use of simple, inexpensive materials such as attractive holly, laurel, rich brown pine cones, moss, soft hemlock - the most graceful of all evergreens, and large clusters of Red Ruscus more brilliant than holly berries.

In all there are 19,288 selected branches of various materials mounted on a wooden frame, braced and reinforced with 3/8 inch steel rods. The wreath is eighteen feet wide and weighs approximately two thousand pounds. The foliage across the frame is six feet wide and the depth of the foliage and filling from the face of the wreath to the base of the frame is over three feet.

December 18, 1947.

The Park Department announces that ceremonies in connection with twenty-two Christmas trees which have been erected and decorated in parks throughout the five boroughs, will take place on Thursday, December 18th, at 5:00 P.M. A special program will be held at the principal trees in each borough, which will be at City Hall Park, Manhattan; Borough Hall Park, Brooklyn; Joyce Kilmer Park, the Bronx; Queensborough Hall, Kew Gardens, Queens; and Borough Hall, Richmond.

At City Hall Park, Manhattan, the ceremonies will be broadcast over

Station WNYC. Vincent R. Impellitteri, President of the City Council, representing

Mayor O'Dwyer, will deliver his annual Christmas message and throw the switch lighting

the sixty-foot high tree, officially starting New York's observance of the Yuletide

season. Borough President Hugo E. Rogers will also participate in the exercises.

Selections will be played by the Department of Sanitation Band, and Christmas carols

will be sung by the Police Department's Glee Club, and a boys' choir from Saint

Cutherine of Siena Church.

Borough Presidents Cashmore, Lyons, Burke and Hall will light the trees in their respective boroughs, where exercises will be conducted under the borough Park Directors who have arranged appropriate programs.

A special decorative scheme depicting the Three Wise Men proceeding to the Star in the East, centered in a holly wreath ten feet in diameter, will be erected over the main entrance of the Park Department Headquarters at the Arsenal, 64 Street and Fifth Avenue, Central Park, Manhattan. The trees will be lighted each evening from 4:30 P.M. until midnight, up to and including January 1, 1948, Christmas trees have been erected at the following locations:

In addition to the large ceremonies, there will also be 100 children's Christmas parties, held between December 18th and the New Year, in the neighborhood playgrounds throughout the five boroughs. In general the parties will include carol singing, tree trimming, and special Christmas games.

The largest of the children's parties in Manhattan will be at Roosevelt Playground and Heckscher Playground on December 22nd, and the Playground at 74th Street and Riverside Drive on December 23. Brooklyn's largest parties will be at Red Hook Play Center on December 22nd and McLaughlin Playground on December 23.

The gayest parties in the Bronx will be at St. Mary's West Playground on December 22nd, and at Mullaly Playground on December 24. Bronx children will also present a dance program on December 30th at Mullaly Recreation Building. Queens will hold its largest parties at Astoria Play Center December 19th and O'Connor Playground on December 22nd and at Newtown Playground on December 23d. In Richmond, parties of unusual interest will be held on December 22nd, at McDonald Playground and at De Matti Playground on December 23d.

On Sunday, December 14th at 18 noon, the American National Fur Breeders Association of Wasau, Wisconsin and the Greater New York Retail Furriers Association, 1451 Broadway, New York City, will formally present two silver foxes to the Central Park Zoo as a Christmas gift to the children of the City of New York.

Mr. Adolph Regent, President of the Greater New York Retail Association will make the presentation and George L. Quigley, Borough Director of Parks in Manhattan will receive the animals for the city and the children.

The animals named "Nip" and "Tuck" arrived on an American Airlines plane last Sunday at La Guardia Airport. Nip is a very rare platinia (platinum) fox and Tuck is an exceeding rare ringneck silver fox. They are both males, 18 months old and are progressive color phase descendants of Hercules Amelia, a pale female silver fox, who was the most consistant winner in the fox show in the National fox shows from 1924-1931.

According to Dr. L.J. O'Reilly, president of the American National Fur Breeders Association, the non-profit, cooperative group which is the co-sponsor of Nip and Tuck, the silver fox industry dates back to 1879 when a pair of wild foxes mated and produced a litter of young in captivity on the farm of Benjamin Heywood, at Tignish, at Prince Edward Island. Fur farming first became a practical commercial enterprise, however, when Sir Charles Dalton and Robert T. Oulton began their experiments in domestication of red and silver foxes in 1887. At the end of the Spanish- American War fabulous prices were paid for the live animals and breeding than became a profitable venture. From that time on, the industry spread to many parts of the United States and Canada.

The animals will be housed in the Anttelope house at which the ceremony will take place.

The Department of Parks requests the cooperation of parents, civic groups, schools and others in cautioning children of the treachery of thin ice and instructing them in safety measures on ice. With the advent of cold weather, lakes and ponds throughout the park system are freezing over.

The first cold snap always seems to serve as an invitation to youngsters to test thin ice, often with disastrous results.

Warning signs have been posted at all lakes and ponds under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks.

When the ice is safe for skating, the Park Department will announce it in the daily papers and over the the municipal broadcasting station N N Y C.

December 2, 1947

The Department of Parks announces the closing of the ten municipal golf courses in the various boroughs and the Pitch Putt Course at Jacob Riis Park, Queens, at the close of play on Sunday, November 36, 1947.

During the past season more than 635,181

rounds were played over the ten courses and approximately 36,639 rounds were played on the Pitch Putt Course.

November 25, 1947

A new playground bounded by Bruckner Boulevard, Cypress

Avenue and 133 and 134 Street, the Bronx, will be opened by the New York

City Park Department for public usage without ceremony on Wednesday,

November 26, 1947.

The property formerly the site of an old piano factory was acquired by the city in 1942 and assigned to the Park Department in 1943 for recreational purposes.

Although only .8 of an acre in extent this triangular shaped play area will provide urgently needed recreation facilities for the adjacent residents of all ages. It provides floodlighted handball courts, basketball courts; a large bituminous surfaced area which can be used for softball in summer, roller skating and also ice skating in winter, a shower to cool off youngsters in hot weather, a sandpit, seesaws, slides, and small and large swings. There is also a combination comfort station and maintenance building.

The various recreational units are separated from each other with fencing for control and the entire area is enclosed with fencing, and landscaped with shade trees. Numerous benches have been provided for mothers and guardians of children and others watching the children at play.

With the addition of this new area there are now 499 playgrounds in the Park system.

A new playground with facilities for all age groups located adjacent to Public School 39, between McFarland and Major Avenues, north of Sand Lane, Richmond, will be opened officially to the public with exercises at 2:30 P.M. on Saturday, November, 22, 1947. The Honorable Cornelius Hall, Borough President of Richmond, Dr. Augusta R. Goldin, Principal of P.S. 39, Dr. Victor Burger, Associate Superintendent of Schools in Richmond, the Rev. Alexander Frier of St. John's Episcopal Church, Father Forrester of the Holy Rosary Church and Albert V. Maniscalco, President of the South Beach Community Council will participate in the ceremony which will be preceded by a parade of civic organizations and school children; James J. Mallen, Park Director in charge of Richmond parks will represent the Department of Parks.

The play area will be operated by the Board of Education during school is sessions and at all other times by the Park Department. It will supply much needed recreational facilities both, for the school children and for the children of the adjacent community.

The new playground contains four separate areas to provide maximum usage and control: One is equipped with sandpit for the younger children, slides, small and large swings, see-saws, and a comfort station; another, a softball diamond and three practice basketball standards; the third, basketball, handball and volley ball courts for adolescents; and the fourth, a separate play area with kindergarten play equipment and a sandpit which will be used as an outside classroom for children of kindergarten age. There is also a small compost and a cold frame school garden for the school children.

The ball field is paved with permanent material and may be used for roller skating. When sub-freezing temperatures permit, it may be flooded and used for ice skating.

The entire area is completely fenced in and landscaped with trees and shrubs.

Some of the attractive plants are the Pocketts, Turners, John S. Bush, Rise of Day and the Melba. Surrounding this feature of the display, banked on the sides of the Greenhouse are numerous smaller size chrysanthemums in 75 varieties, such as the Pompons, the Anemone and the Single Daisy type.

In the class of varieties in all shades of bronze, red, yellow and white, some of the outstanding chrysanthemums to be exhibited are the Crimson Red, Purple Queens, Red Rover, Orchid Beauty, Cleopatra and New York.

The New York City Park Department's Fifth Annual Outdoor Chrysanthemum display is coming into full bloom in Manhattan at the Central Park Conservatory Gardens, 105 Street and Fifth Avenue; The Plaza at Fifth Avenue and 59th
Street; Bryant Park, 42nd Street and Avenue of the Americas; Riverside Park at
105th Street; Fort Tryon Park, Heather Garden; Bowling Green Park, Broadway and
Whitehall Street; and Cadman Plaza, Fulton and Tillary Streets, Brooklyn. The
display will last for at least two weeks.

These permanent and colorful massed plantings are the gift of Mrs.

Albert D. Lasker, of New York City, to the Department of Parks in memory of her

mother and are known as the Sara Woodard Memorial Chrysanthemum Plantings. Mrs.

Woodard who died in New York City on January 8th, 1940, was one of the founders of

two parks in Watertown, Wisconsin, and a member of the Park Association of New York

City, Inc.

Over 8,500 individual plants have been used in this year's display. Massed solidly in large scale plantings the flowers range in color from white through pale yellow to pink to brilliant red. The plants range in size from the small dwarf varieties to plants more than three feet in spread.

All the plants in New York City's display are seedlings and cuttings from the "Chicago" strain of winter-hardy chrysanthemums developed by Dr. E.J.

Krause, Chairman of the Botany Department of the University of Chicago. Dr. Krause stimulated by the desire to create a flower that could be used by the amateur gardener to extend the blooming period of a garden by as much as six weeks began his experiments in 1934. He wanted to develop a chrysanthemum whose flower would withstand severe frost, and whose plants would survive sub-zero temperatures.

Each year thousands of seedlings were grrown and out of these fifty to one hundred outstanding plants were selected for further testing. In the Fall

of 1941 twelve varieties of these winter-hardy mums were selected and made available to the public through nursery-men and commercial growers and new varieties have been developed in recent years.

In the Spring of 1942 Mrs. Lasker gave the seeds and funds to establish the original plantings at the Conservatory Gardens and at Bryant Park to the New York City Park Department. The additional plantings were made in the succeeding years. The Park Department has found this chrysanthemum one of the rew flowers that will bear up under frost, and the only plant having a wide range of color that is suitable in this section of the country for mass fall plantings.

# STATEMENT BY COMMISSIONER MOSES ON THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE HENRY HUDSON PARKWAY TURNOUTS

Plans have been prepared by New York State Department of Public Works for the construction of a series of emergency turnouts for the parking of disabled automobiles on the Henry Hudson Parkway between 72nd Street and the George Washington Bridge. The contracts have been submitted to the Board of Estimate for approval. All costs will be paid by the State with Federal Aid.

For the greater part of this section the roadway is either on a viaduct or adjacent to sharply sloping ground or other structures and facilities with shoulders too narrow to permit disabled motorists to pull aff the pavement and out of moving lanes of traffic for repairs or to wait for the arrival of a tow car. During weekdays' heavy traffic hours and on warm weekends and holidays this condition results in delay, confusion and serious tie-ups.

Department of Public Works officials, it was found that 15 turnouts on the northbound roadway and 13 turnouts on the southbound lanes between West 72nd Street and the George Washington Bridge could be constructed without serious alterations to the parkway or extensive and costly tetaining walls. The spacing will be close enough to determine the effectiveness of the turnouts as a substitute for a continuous shoulder designed to accommodate disabled cars.

The width of the turnouts will be approximately eighteen feet. From entrance to exit they will be seventy feet long, separated from moving traffic by a two-foot wide concrete curb and brick island. They will be paved with stone blocks with grass joints, and these will eventually develop an appearance approximating the adjacent lawn areas. At the same time, they will not be subject to the drainage suffered by turf.

The turnouts will be located on the northbound lane opposite West 7th, 84th, 87th, 88th, 90th, 100th, 103rd, 105th, 108th, 112th, 116th, 124th, 148th, 158th, and 172nd Streets, and on the southbound lane opposite West 72nd, 86th, 89th, 106th, 110th, 112th, 114th, 116th, 117th, 118th, 120th, 122nd, and 162nd Streets.

If these turnouts prove successful they will be installed on other city parkways where, because of a narrow right-of-way, normal width shoulders were not possible. Considerable traffic relief is anticipated during the peak traffic periods when one or two disabled cars with flat tires or mechanical difficulties completely disrupt moving traffic.

The Department of Parks has completed the reconstruction of Linden Park in the block bounded by 41 Avenue, 42 Avenue, 103 Street and 104 Street, Corona Queens.

This is one of the oldest neighborhood parks in Queens and was first shown on a map of the Village of West Flushing in the Township of Newtown, Queens County, Long Island, New York, filed in 1853. It was one of the few remaining old type parks. which were perfectly satisfactory many years ago but which cannot be maintained properly under the intensive use of densely populated neighborhoods.

It has been completely reconstructed to increase both active and passive recreational facilities and will serve the residents of the adjacent community as well as the public school across the street. The redesign permits more efficient operation and maintenance of the area. Besides filling in the old pond, probably one of the original public watering places of the old Town of Newtown, the major work consisted of the construction of two small children's play areas along the margins of the park, with swings, slides, sand pits, exercise units, shuffleboard courts, seesaws and other similar equipment; a large paved area for softball, roller and ice skating and other group games. Pedestrian walks were realigned for better circulation and old lawn areas were rehabilitated. The beautiful old trees were retained and new ones planted to landscape the park. Numerous benches have been provided under the shade trees to provide sitting areas for those seeking passive recreation and also for the guardians and mothers of children at play.

The addition of this new playground brings the total in the park system to 497.

The Department of Parks and the Borough President of Brooklyn announce the selection of a site for a neighborhood playground at East 49th Street and Tilden Avenue, Brooklyn.

The property, which has an assessed valuation of \$42,000, will be acquired by President Cashmore by borough assessment. The playground will be built by the Department of Parks with funds allocated for this purpose in the Capital Budget. Acquistion will be completed in 1948 and the playground will be opened for use in the summer of 1949.

The playground will contain a comfort station, small children's play area with swings, see-saws, wading pool, etc., and handball courts, basket-ball and open spaces for older children and adults.

Recently, the Park Department received a petition from more than two thousand residents of the neighborhood urging immediate action on this long-needed facility. This is a heavily populated residential district and the nearest existing playground is more than a mile away. Since the Department's funds for the acquistion of property are limited, it was impossible for it to take independent action. When the situation was brought to the attention of Borough President Cashmore, he promptly agreed to acquire the property by borough assessment.

The Park Department announces that in addition to the heaviest use by the pullic of park facilities generally in many years, the income during the period from January 1 to September 1, 1947, from the revenue producing facilities, as well as the income from concessionaires licensed to operate in public parks, has reached a new high.

The usage of revenue producing facilities of the Park Department, which consist of 2 beaches, 17 outdoor swimming pools, 10 golf courses, and 520 tennis courts, has shown a steady increase in the postwar years.

This is indicated by the revenue from admissions at the outdoor swimming pools, from locker rentals at Jacob Riis Park in Queens and Orchard Beach, in the Bronx, and golf and tennis permits, which provided an income up to September 1, 1947 of \$842,546., an increase of \$65,960. over 1946 and an increase of \$131,718, over the pre-war year of 1941. This income was made up of 1,793,923 admissions to the swimming pools, 19,766 season permits and 469,467 rounds of golf, 20,249 season permits for tennis, and 406,910 locker rentals at the 2 revenue producing beaches of the park system.

In addition to this revenue from the facilities mentioned above, the Park Department reports that \$538,072. was paid into the City Treasury by concessionaires in parks throughout the City. These concessions range from bootblack stands to full-scale restaurants and include such facilities as rowboating, gasoline stations, horseback riding, cafeterias, pony tracks, boat basins, and carousels. This is an increase of \$66,649. over 1946 and a increase of \$256,677. over 1941, the increase over the pre-war year amounting to  $90\frac{1}{2}\%$ .

Thus, the Park Department has turned in to the City Treasury, as of Septem-1st, \$1,380,618. or an increase of \$388,395. over 1941, the last pre-war year.

99,312,000 visits were made to Department of Parks recreation facilities during the summer according to an announcement made by Park officials. This indicates that New Yorkers of all ages have learned to take advantage of their city's recreation resources.

It is estimated that over 81,000,000 people used New York City's six municipal beaches during the summer. This tops last year's beach attendance by 12,000,000. An additional million and three quarters enjoyed the Perk Department's seventeen outdoor swimming pools; this includes 216,000 youngsters who were admitted free of charge during the morning period reserved for children. In the annual Learn to Swim campaign, 3,600 children were taught to swim. Two series of swimming meets were held during July and August: six Journal-American sponsored meets for girls, and six New York Mirror sponsored meets for boys. Junior and Senior Metropolitan A.A.U. Championship events were held in conjunction with both swimming tournaments. Over 3,200 boys and girls swam in these meets, many enjoying the thrill of competitive swimming for the first time.

Over 500,000 reunds of golf have been played on the ten municipal courses during the season to date. Local and City-wide Championship tournaments were held for men, women, and junior boys in which almost two thousand golfers teed off. A five-borough tennis tournament, for which 2,000 players turned out, was held on Park courts.

Eight thousand children participated in the Annual Summer Sports Tournament, a program of special events for children under 18 years of age, sponsored by the New York Community Trust. This tournament embraces a One Act Play Contest, and Table Tennis, Checkers and Jacks Contests. Individual contests in each of these activities were conducted, starting with playground eliminations, and ending with inter-borough competition to select City Championships.

Over 14,000 boys played in a softball tournament in the M rror League, and many additional thousands of players used the 454 softball and baseball diamonds for daily games and exercise, and provided a source of recreation for a great number of spectators.

During the summer, the Department of Parks conducted seven track and field meets, sponsored by the New York Athletic Club, Metropolitan A.A.U., and Kiwanis Clubs and in which more than 4,500 boys and girls competed.

Among the most popular summer activities designed for youngsters were the marionette and magic shows. Eighty magic shows and 108 marionette shows played to small fry audiences totalling 100,000 in playgrounds of the five boroughs. Both traveling shows will make fall appearances soon.

Another popular summer activity for children was the annual dance festival held in each of the five boroughs. Two thousand girls were taught folk, ballet, and character dancing by playground directors in local playgrounds, and helped to make their own costumes for these events. 40,000 parents and friends witnessed these shows.

In addition to these special features, a recreation program consisting of arts, crafts, drama, dancing, sports, story telling, singing and group games, was carried on daily in 495 playgrounds, by a staff of playground directors who organized, supervised, and promoted the activities. The play program included basketball, handball, volleyball, softball, shuffleboard, paddle tennis, horseshoe pitching, the use of swings, see-saws, slides, exercise units, and the ever popular wading pools. Many New Yorkers also enjoyed boating on the lakes, riding on the bridle and bicycle paths, bowling on the green, playing cricket, fishing, and model yachting at special areas provided for these sports.

A full season of concerts and dancing rounded out the musical side of the summer recreation program. A series of fifty-four Name Band Dances which concluded last Friday at Prospect Park, was sponsored by Consolidated Edison Company, and was enjoyed by a half million dancers and listeners, Such well known leaders as Tony

Pastor, Johnny Bothwell, Johnny Long, Bobby Byrne, and Sunny Dunham led their orchestras for these starlight dances. The Name Band program was climaxed by a dance contest, in which eliminations were held in all boroughs, and finals on the Central Park Mall before an audience of 10,000 spectators.

Square dancing, which enjoys growing popularity, was sponsored on three evenings a week by the Pepsi-Cola Company. Nine thousand dancers do-si-doed every Monday night at Riverisde Drive and 193rd Street, and several thousand more did like-vise at Central Park Mall on Saturday atternoons, and at the Prospect Park Dance Area on Tuesday nights. Square Dancing will continue at these locations until September 20th. Other cutdoor dances sponsored by various organizations and held in the parks attracted 100,000 dancers.

Lovers of concert music were well provided for during the past summer. The Goldman Band, marking its thirtieth season in the parks, rendered fifty concerts for approximately 400,000 listeners in Central and Prospect Parks. The City Amateur Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Hon. Leopold Prince, gave six concerts on the Mall, entertaining 34,000 listeners. Four Naumburg Memorial concerts were provided, with conductors Nicholas Rescigno, Rev. Leonardo Pavone, Dean Dixon, and Rudolf Doblin sharing the honors.

The summer park recreation program just completed is part of the Department of Parks never ending effort to fill the twelve months of the year with heathful and enjoyable activities for all ages. The Park Department is looking forward to a busy season of fall sports and activities in its facilities throughout the five boroughs.

The last week of free outdoor dances of the season will be held this week, September 15th to 20th, thus concluding a total of 42 outdoor dances which have been given for New Yorkers and Brooklynites throughout the summer, sponsored by Pepsi-Cola Company, under the auspices of the Department of Parks.

The entire series has taken place throughout the summer at Riverside Drive and 103rd Street every Monday night; at Prospect Park, Brooklyn, every Tuesday night; and at Central Park Mall every Saturday afternoon.

Altogether officials of the Park Department estimate that over a quarter of a million New Yorkers and Brooklynites attended the series. 

This will mark the end of a successful season of water activities and competitions in which approximately 1,795,000 children and adults enjoyed the facilities of the pools. During the summer 3,200 youngsters participated in swimming meets in the pools. Many young swimmers had their first taste of Competitive swimming in these Park Department meets.

The Lifeguard Championship Tournament will be conducted at Rockaway Beach at 97th Street, on Thursday, August 21, at 1 P.M. according to an announcement by the Department of Parks. In case of rain, it will be held on Friday, August 22nd at 2 P.M.

The annual competition was resumed last year after a wartime interruption and will be held this year when the cream of the Park Department trained staff of 500 lifeguards compete in nine events to determine who is the most expert and proficient in all phases of their vocation.

The individual Lifeguard Chempionships will be decided by three of the events: the 75 yard Individual Surf rescue, the quarter-mile Speed Swim, and the half-mile Catamaran Race. Winners of first, second and third place will receive medals and the lifeguard scoring the most points will be awarded the championship trophy.

Tho beach championship will be determined by the remaining six events: the half mile swim, the half mile Catamaran Race, Three Man Rescue Race, 200 yard Obstacle Race, 350 yard Catamaran Rescue Race and the 75 yard Individual Surf Rescue. Rockaway Beach, last year's champion, will defend its title against Orchard Beach, Bronx; South Beach, Richmond; Coney Island, Brooklyn; and Jacob Riis Park, Queens. Points will be scored for the first five places and the beach with the highest score will win the trophy. Medals will also be awarded to the winner of each of these events.

"Victims" will, of course, be volunteers, in all the rescue races.



The Park Department will open to the public without ceremonies on Saturday, August. 16. 1947 a new 1.4 acre playground, bounded by Old Broadway West 126 and West 129th Streets and Amsterdam Avenue, Manhattan.

This was the site of the former Orphan Asylum buildings operated by Sheltering Arms and in recognition of the good work of this charitable institution in the community and in view of the long association with this property the City Council passed a local law naming it Sheltering Arms Park. The property was acquired by the City by purchase on January 4th, 1945 for a park and playground site and for the future Riverside Health Sub-station.

This new recreational area will provide urgently needed additional recreation facilities in a densely populated neighborhood.

The playground provides a large bituminous surfaced area for roller skating, softball and group games, horseshoe pitching and handball courts, small and large swings, see-saws and slides, a shower basin, a sand pit, and a comfort station.

The various play units are separated by fencing for control purposes. Numerous benches have been provided under the shade trees for mothers and guardians of children.

The addition of this new playground brings the total in the park system to 495.

Row boating which has not been available at the 110th Street Lake in Central Park since 1941, when the reconstruction of the Harlem Meer section of Central Park was started and the old rowboats were taken to 72nd Street Lake for use there will be resumed on Friday, August 8th.

In 1942 the improvement of the area, a relief project, was abandoned and left unfinished by the W.P.A. Some of the basic work was completed by contract during the war so that the area could be made available to the public. However, because of difficulties in procuring critical materials the construction of the boathouse and other necessary facilities had to be postponed.

The 360-foot landing platform and combination brick boathouse, comfort station and refreshment concession building in modified victorian style in harmony with the architecture of other structures in the park, together with plumbing, heating and electrical work on the north shore of the lake near the Fifth Avenue entrance are now completed. The building and its facilities will serve adequately boating enthusiasts during summer and fall months and ice skaters when sub-freezing winter conditions permit.

The reconstruction and redesign of the historical Harlem Meer was necessary to permit increased use of the area and, at the same time, eliminate maintenance problems by improving access and providing better control. The work includes an adequate walk system with ramps, stairs, fences, additional benches, drinking fountains, the planting of trees and shrubs, the seeding and restoration of lawn areas; and a four-foot concrete wall with a fifteen feet abutting promenade completely around the lake.

Frequent connections have been made with a secondary path system which

connects with the various entrances and also the general path system. This was necessitated by the tremendous usage of the area and the change in neighborhoods.

For patrons who will be visiting this spot during the warm weather, there will be ample refreshments. The food bar will be stocked with an assortment of hot and cold beverages, ice cream, frankfurters and candy... dispensed under the most sanitary conditions. Prices, both for food and rowboat rental, will be at a moderate and popular level. The boathouse will be operated under the direction of the Department of Parks by the present licensee of the boating concession at 72nd Street Lake, who is well equipped and qualified to operate the new facility.







Doar General:

Shortly before I returned from Germany, Borough President Rogers wrote you defending the recommendations of the Traffic Committee for the construction of underground garages in Bryant and Madison Square Parks. This letter was released to the newspapers.

First, let me clear up one seeming misunderstanding on his part.

I did not at any time say that it was impossible from an engineering standpoint to construct underground garages in either of these parks. Such garages
could be built. So could a tunnel to China if no one cared about costs and
no destruction, temporary and permanent, of old traditional parks were involved.

My point is that the garages would be impractical from an economic and traffic
standpoint, and that they would shut the parks for a long time and permanently
disfigure them. This would inevitably have a deleterious effect upon the
surrounding extremely valuable private property. It would be an outrage which
many of our people would intensely resent.

I know what parking garages cost since the Triborough Bridge Authority is building one and I have built others before. I also know that there is a tendency on the part of everyone interested in the construction of parking garages to be optimistic in estimates of costs in the analysis of income and operation. I can say flatly and without the slightest exaggeration that the Borough President has grossly underestimated the cost of these parking garages. The figures submitted to you are just about enough to build two garages above ground, and wholly inadequate for an underground structure. I know this to be a fact because they are about the same per stall as the latest estimate for the Battery Garage.

We have made a careful engineering investigation of the cost of the respective underground garages and our estimate is that the garage at Bryant Park will cost \$6,100,000 and that the one at Madison Square Park will cost \$8,100,000, a total of \$14,200,00. Compare this with the Borough President's estimate of \$9,000,000 for two garages, which, by the way, is an increase of \$1,800,00 over the figure released in the traffic report only a few weeks ago.

The above is factual information which can be easily sustained. There are even more serious objections to the destruction of either of these parks by the construction of underground

parking garages. The history of the City is one of continued encroachment of open and public places. It is only in recent years that City officials and the public as a whole have been intelligent enough to realize the importance of our small parks to the welfare and orderly development of the City. The parks and squares, in addition to providing light, air and recreation to our people, have been an important factor in the maintenance of realty values. Desirable residential and business space has remained around the parks and, although many of the areas away from the parks have deteriorated and have become business and residential slums, the park frontage remains attractive, rentable and high in value.

An underground garage, no matter how it is designed, must interfere with the normal use and attractiveness of the park itself. Long gashes will have to be cut back into the park to provide ramps in and out of the garage. Thousands of additional cars will be drawn into the area each day with resultant noise, confusion and gasoline fumes. The park will become unsatisfactory from a recreation standpoint and the influx of traffic will render the abutting privately-owned property undesirable for business or residential use.

Within the last decade, Bryant Park was reconstructed at a tremendous cost. The trees, shrubbery and other planting is now only beginning to reach a stage of development where the real beauty and attractiveness of the park is becoming apparent. No matter how carefully the surface of the park is restored, it will take another ten years before it has even a semblance of its present appearance. This is true to an even greater extent at Madison Square Park, which contains trees that have taken fifty years to grow and which can be replaced only with small trees which will probably never reach the age or beauty of the present ones because of the unfevorable conditions under which they will have to grow.

Both parks are in extremely bad locations as far as traffic conditions are concerned. Entrances could be provided to the Bryant Park garage only on 40th Street and the thousands of cars using this garage would have to be funnelled through a street which is presently almost impassable. Madison Square Park is located at the intersection of Broadway, Fifth Avenue and 23rd Street, and is at the southerly terminus of Madison Avenue. No matter where the entrances and exits are placed, they are certain to add seriously to traffic congestion. Our studies show that the center of the need for the parking space is to the east and north of Madison Square Park, and that it should be placed on relatively inexpensive land in the center of the blocks to the east of Madison Avenue.

May I again call to your attention the recommendation made by the Triborough Bridge and Turnel Authority on December 2, 1946 to the effect that the report on parking garages include a complete study of the financial soundness of the project, in other words, just how they are to be financed and how much of the project will be genuinely self-liquidating. Without this material, the City may be assuming financial responsibility for projects which are completely unsound financially. If, as the newspapers indicate, the public insists upon the subways paying interest, amortization and operating costs, they are certainly going to be more insistent that people who can afford to use their automobiles as a means of getting into Manhattan pay their own way.

The construction of parking garages in the first stage can at best be only an experiment to show whether or not they actually provide the expected relief. The most logical location to start such an experiment would be on plots near the approaches to the island of Manhattan and conveniently located with respect to our transit system. For this reason, I again urge that the administration concentrate on the site at the Queensborough Bridge, and on the new Madison Square Garden proposal at Columbus Circle.

The City Planning Commission at its meeting today adopted a new location of the Major Deegan Expressway northeasterly through the southeasterly corner of Van Cortlandt Park as part of the Master Plan of Arterial Highways and Major Streets. The new route enters the park at Putnam Avenue East, crosses to the east and then follows Jerome Avenue to the New York City line. The Commission approved the new route after a public hearing as the one causing a minimum of inconvenience to Van Cortlandt Park and the surrounding areas.

The route selected is one of five considered by State,
Westchester County and New York City officials during the past two
years. The controlling factor in selecting a route for the highway
was the point of exit from the city. After several conferences with
Westchester County and State officials, it was decided that the
logical truck outlet through Westchester County was Central Avenue.
This is a broad, paved highway which the State intends to improve
in the near future for the primary purpose of providing a through
artery for mixed traffic. The route approved by the Planning Commission and now part of the Master Plan will join with Central
Avenue at the county line.

The first scheme contemplated the use of the abandoned right-of-way of the Yonkers branch of the New York Central Railroad through Van Cortlandt Park. This was discarded because of the lack of suitable outlets in Westchester County and because it would bisect

the park for its full length. The right-of-way of the railroad was acquired by the City of New York some years ago, thus eliminating a barrier which previously divided Van Cortlandt Park for its entire length.

.

Another route carried the main roadway of Major Deegan Expressway westerly across the southerly portion of Van Cortlandt Park into Broadway and thence northerly along Broadway and part of the westerly boundary of the park to the New York City line. This proposal would have required the release and utilization of substantial areas in Van Cortlandt Park. Because of the park lands involved and the inability of finding any practical way for the State of New York to extend the thoroughfare northerly in Westchester County through the substantial industrial and business sections of Yonkers, the plan was abandoned.

An additional investigation was made of the possibility of carrying the expressway on two different alignments up the escarpment in the vicinity of 231st Street, thence skirting Jerome Park Reservoir on the west, entering Van Cortlandt Park at Mosholu Parkway, crossing the southerly portion of Mosholu Golf Course and continuing northerly on a widened Jerome Avenue. This plan would have required the demolition of many residential buildings and would have effectively cut off all access to the park from adjacent residential districts. Furthermore, the proposed grades were excessive, the alignment poor and the construction would have been too expensive. For these reasons, this plan was also abandoned.

A fourth proposition was a consideration of extending the expressway northerly along Bailey Avenue into Van Cortlandt Park,

easterly through a deep rock cut to Mosholu Parkway and from that point easterly and northerly along the route previously described. While this proved to be more advantageous as far as alignment and grades were concerned, it had the disadvantage of limiting the access to the park from the south and east. It would have meant an extremely expensive rock excavation adjacent to the Amalgamated Housing Project and would have required the complete reconstruction of both Van Cortlandt and Mosholu Golf Courses and the closing of the courses during reconstruction. This is the location previously shown on the Master Plan.

The plan approved by the Commission is the fifth one given serious study and consideration by the Park Department, the City Planning Commission, the City Construction Co-Ordinator, the Borough President of the Bronx and Westchester County and State officials. The final decision of accepting this scheme was reached by all the conferees when the disadvantages of the other suggestions were considered. The topographical features of the park had a great deal to do with this conclusion. The southerly half of Van Cortlandt Park is generally at two levels separated by a steep embankment approximately along Mosholu Parkway extension. It contains the Van Cortlandt Golf Course and the Van Cortlandt Lake at the lower level and the Mosholu Golf Course and a large wooded area at the upper level. Both golf courses are completely fenced and are not open for general use by the public. The only means of access between the upper and lower levels of the park is by a park road leading from Mosholu Parkway to the lake and by a park road entering at about 233rd Street. Beyond this, there is no way for persons to go from one section of

the park to the other except by scrambling up and down the steep seventy-five foot embankment. Access between the high and low level portions of the park is retained under the approved plan. The expressway will not interfere with access to the periphery of the park from adjacent residential sections and requires a minimum amount of grading with no disfigurement of natural topographical features. It will pass in back of Mosholu Golf Course and through a very small portion of the Van Cortlandt Golf Course which will necessitate only some reconstruction of the latter course. The only other substantial park improvements within the new right-of-way are the old frame riding stables and frame maintenance buildings near the Bailey Avenue entrance which the State of New York will replace with modern structures in a more accessible location in the park.

The Park Department is generally opposed to the construction of mixed traffic arteries through parks. However, large parks cannot act as a barrier and, as in this instance, virtually isolate Central Bronx from Westchester County. The situation is not unusual and commercial traffic uses roads leading to City Island. Fordham Road and Boston Post Road cross Bronx Park. Flushing Meadow Park is crossed by Northern Boulevard, Roosevelt Avenue, Horace Harding Boulevard and 69th Road, while Central Park also is traversed by mixed traffic arteries.

There is no alternative except to pass through the park at some point and the Park Department consented to this plan for the extension of Major Deegan Expressway only after careful study of the alternatives. The route will result in no damage to the park nor will it interfere with the normal use and development thereof. It

is the only plan that is not detrimental to the surrounding residential neighborhood and, furthermore, the only one that will not isolate the park from the surrounding residential communities. An express artery through the park with proper provision for vehicular, pedestrian and equestrian crossings, will interfere less with the recreational use of the park than the existing roads which must be crossed at grade. A modern expressway design is similar in all respects to the parkways built in New York City in recent years. The Park Department has set up rigid requirements for the design of Major Deegan Expressway with high standards for aesthetic treatment and construction which will not be detrimental to the park.

The route, as adopted by the Planning Commission, has the full approval of the Borough President of the Bronx. Commissioner of Borough Works Arthur Sheridan, representing him at the public hearing in the Planning Commission, outlined the studies and investigations of various alternate routes for this expressway and demonstrated the advantages and disadvantages of each. He stated that the new plan, which entails the full utilization of the present park roads, the landscaping of the expressway and the relocation of several recreational facilities and pedestrian walks in connection with the physical improvement, will enhance rather than curtail the existing uses and will provide increased safety for the patrons of the park.

With the past three day holiday record breaking weekend and summer making up for lost time the 17 municipally operated swimming pools scattered around the five boroughs and the beaches at Coney Island, Rockaway, Jacob Riis, Orchard Beach in the Bronx; and South Beach and Wolfes Pond Park in Richmond attracted millions of people seeking relief from the sweltering heat,

Park Department personnel and the police assigned to the facilities as usual had their hands full restoring strayed and lost children to their parents, cleaning up litter, and rescuing ambitious swimmers who had over estimated thier strength or ability.

The Park Department has increased the number of lifeguards this year so visitors to the beaches can use them with safety. Five additional Chief Lifeguards and forty-four new lieutenants have been assigned to the beaches and outdoor swimming pools throughout the park system, and there are now 6 chief lifeguards, 17 lieutenants and 192 lifeguards at Rockaway Beach, 4 chief lifeguards, 8 lieutenants and 92 lifeguards at Coney Island, 2 chief lifeguards, 4 lieutenants and 51 lifeguards at Orchard Beach, 1 chief lifeguard, 2 lieutenants and 41 lifeguards at South Beach, 1 lieutenant and 6 lifeguards at Wolfes Pond, and 2 chief lifeguards, 3 lieutenants and 35 lifeguards at Jacob Riis. At the larger outdoor swimming pools there will be assigned with the new additions 9 lieutenants and 72 lifeguards.

The public is requested to cooperate with the department in providing safe clean beaches by refraining from conversation with the lifeguards who must concentrate their complete attention on the bathers; by taking their problems to the nearest first aid station or police officer; by placing litter in the wire trash baskets, by leaving at home inflatable rubber tubes and rafts which are prohibited at beaches; by refraining from playing ball and by keeping out of the area between the lifeguards and the waters edge.
