Applications soon will be available to individuals interested in applying for the temporary positions of seasonal parkmen, seasonal park helpers and playground assistants, it was announced today by Park Commissioner Newbold Morris.

Beginning February 23rd, applications for these non-competitive positions will be issued and received by the Department of Parks. No formal eligible list will result from the receipt of the applications.

Commissioner Morris says that applicants for seasonal employment will be considered in the order of filing applications. However, primary consideration will be given to applicants who had been previously employed by the Park Department and had performed satisfactory service.

During the week of February 23 through 28, the applications will be issued and received ONLY at the Brooklyn War Memorial Recreation Center, located in Cadman Plaza. Thereafter, from March 1 through April 23, the applications will be issued and received at the Department of Parks main office in each of the five boroughs.

"Letters of recommendation are unnecessary," adds the Commissioner.

"Applicants will be considered on the basis of their prior service or qualifications."

Listed below are details relative to each seasonal position:

SEASONAL PARKMAN

SALARY AND VACANCIES: There are approximately 1,085 seasonal positions in the Department of Parks at salaries of \$12.00 per day. The employment period may extend from MARCH 15th to NOVEMBER 30th for a maximum of 200 days a year, not to exceed 6 days a week.

Senior citizens are enjoying a colorful form of self-expression at the J. Hood Wright Golden Age Center, Manhattan, where special art classes in oil painting are held four times weekly, it was revealed today by Park Commissioner Newbold Morris.

The free classes, inaugurated at the Center by the department's Recreation Division two years ago, have literally brought to the surface of a canvas the latent creative ability of a good many of the elderly pupils.

Under the personalized instruction of Recreation Leader and artist Frank Jankowitz, folks who had no idea they could draw - much less paint - became amazed at what they could really accomplish.

From their palettes and brushes have come captivating landscapes, seascapes and varied still life paintings. The ages of the artist-pupils range from 60 to 90 years of age.

"The course continues to be highly popular as a constructive, pleasant pastime," says Commissioner Morris. "You might say these golden agers are showing their true colors in a most delightful way."

Newcomers to the classes learn the important basic art techniques, including dimension and perspective. Sketching is followed by the use, mixture and application of primary colors and acquiring the "feel" of using brushes.

Art instruction in the Center, at West 173rd Street and Ft. Washington Avenue, is featured Mondays from 10 a.m. to 12 noon; Tuesdays from 7-9 p.m.; Wednesdays from 3-5 p.m. and Thursdays from 7-9 p.m.

Similar art classes are featured in other Golden Age Centers under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks.

Dear Henry:

This is in response to your letter of November 23, 1964 concerning the proposed use of the parkways by 12-passenger airport limousines. I fail to detect a valid analogy between such vehicles and the 4 and 5-passenger taxicabs.

Taxicabs are used primarily for personal pleasure. They are used by the public in much the same manner as privately-owned passenger cars and in no way interfere with the enjoyment of the parkway system by its other users.

On the other hand, the elongated airport limousines serve only the one commercial purpose of carrying passengers to and from the commercial air lines at the airports. Describing them as medium-sized Carey buses would be as justifiable as your description of them as "nothing more than a large taxicab." In my opinion they are clearly barred from the use of the parkways by State law.

I shall continue to oppose this amendment to the traffic regulations. Both the tone and substance of your letter indicate that this is only a tentative and modest first stage in the progressive and cumulative erosion of the principles and purposes on which the City's great parkway system was established and that I must fight with every legal means available to me.

ANIMAL TIME AT THE ZOO

On June 24, 1965, at 4:30 p.m., New York's first all animal band will make its debut at the Central Park Zoo. Present to welcome this musical group will be Mayor Robert F. Wagner, Park Commissioner Newbold Morris, World's Fair President Robert Moses, Manhattan Borough President Constance Baker Motley, and other distinguished persons.

The animal band is appearing in New York through the courtesy of Mr. George T. Delacorte, who arranged for its passage from Italy. The members include a tambourine-playing bear, a hippopotamus that plays the violin, an elephant that plays the accordion, a goat that plays the flute, a kangaroo that plays a horn, and a penguin that beats the drum.

Performances will be held daily atop the archway approach to the Children's Zoo - opposite 65th Street - on the hour and the half hour. The band's repertoire consists of 32 different melodies, including familiar nursery rhymes, such as, "Ding Dong Dell," "Hickory, Dickory, Dock," "Three Blind Mice," and other popular tunes.

Feeding or feuding will pose no problem for these animals, as all are bronze. The band is in fact part of New York's first fully animated clock a conception of Mr. Delacorte, who previously gave the citizens of New York the superb bronze "Alice in Wonderland" monument and the popular Delacorte Theatre, both in Central Park.

The clock is a gift to the city by Mr. Delacorte, through the philanthropic corporation of which he is chairman, MAKE NEW YORK BEAUTIFUL, INC. Miss Cassandra Delacorte - his granddaughter - will unveil the clock.

The Delacorte Clock in Central Park consists of six bronze animal figures, each four feet high, which were cast in Rome, Italy—a bear playing a tambourine, a hippopotamus that plays a violin, an elephant that plays the accordion, a goat that plays a flute, a kangaroo that plays a horn, and a penguin that beats a drum. They revolve around the clock tower under a canopy for two minutes. Two monkeys on top of the tower are posed in the position of striking a bronze bell, which forms the crowning feature of the entire installation. The clock has two faces — one on the north side and the other on the south side.

The mechanism for moving the six figures under the canopy consists of an electric motor power-drive, connected by chain to a gear sprocket which acts as a flywheel. The shaft of this flywheel sprocket-gear powers a master chain to which the bases of the bronze figures are attached. This chain rotates around the tower and pulls the bronze figures with it while they are rotating on their axes.

A separate mechanism moves the monkeys on top of the tower to simulate an action toward striking the bell. All of the figures move for approximately two minutes at the stroke of each half hour. Movement is synchronized with the clock as well as with the Schulmerich carillon electric bell system which FACT SHEET - Page 2 (DELACORTE ANIMATED CLOCK)

is installed in the attic of the monkey house. The speakers of the sound system are located in the walls of the clock tower just below the canopy level. The three principal actions -- each half hour on the clock; the movement of the figures; and the music from the simulated bells-are all synchronized.

Thirty-two different tunes will be played by the clock and no one tune will be repeated in the course of a day. Included in the musical repertoire are nursery rhymes, such as, "Ding Dong Dell," "Hickory, Dickory, Dock," "Three Blind Mice," and other appropriate tunes.

Operation will be on a year-round basis. To insure the working of the mechanisms through the winter period, the installation includes fin-tube radiation placed parallel to and on each side of the chain-drive, which will provide heat to prevent freezeup. The steam for this heating system is supplied from a connection in the attic of the lion house.

The clock is a gift to the City by Mr. George T. Delacorte through the philanthropic corporation of which he is chairman, MAKE NEW YORK BEAUTIFUL, INC. The design of the project was by Fernando Texidor; the architect, Edward Coe Embury; and the animals were created by the Italian sculptor, Andrea Spadini.





DEBUT OF ACOUSTICAL SHELL FOR NEW YORK PHILHARMONIC OUTDOOR CONCERTS

A specially designed mobile stage and acoustical shell are being constructed for the series of concerts to be given by the New York Philharmonic in parks of the five boroughs of the City of New York this summer. They have been designed by Christopher Jaffe, Consultant in Musical Acoustics and Theatre Design, and constructed by Stagecraft Corporation in Norwalk, Connecticut. The stage is capable of holding a full-size symphony orchestra of more than 100 players, plus chorus and soloists. The stage area, which is of a size comparable with that of Philharmonic Hall, Lincoln Center, is made up of four units. Each unit comprises a trailer 33 feet in length, with sides that fold down to form a large platform. Two such trailers are placed end-to-end to provide the stage width, while two more of similar length are placed in parallel behind to produce the stage depth. The ceiling of the shell is raised hydraulically on this stage, and a fiberglass wall is erected to define the acoustical properties of the shell. The shell is fully lit and incorporates a sound reinforcement system to discreetly boost the natural sound of a symphony orchestra playing within the shell. The power for the sound and lighting systems is supplied by a portable generator especially silenced so that it will not interfere with the performances.

At the conclusion of each concert, the shell and trailers are speedily returned to traveling condition, and the auxiliary equipment may be stored on each trailer. Music stands, conductor's podium, and heavy music instruments are, of course, carried by van.

The great advantage to the orchestra to be able to use such

equipment is that it can play each concert under consistent conditions regardless of its location anywhere in the City.

The trailers and shell are the property of the City of New York, which is providing \$175,000 for the design and construction of this facility. The New York Philharmonic is underwriting the musical costs, estimated at \$100,000. The Jos. Schlitz Brewing Company is contributing \$50,000 towards the costs of presenting the twelve concerts in the five borough parks in August, while the remainder of the costs involved will be met with other contributions over and above the New York Philharmonic's regular fund raising.

The New York Philharmonic plays at Sheep Meadow, Central Park, on Tuesday, August 10th, Tuesday, August 17th, and Tuesday, August 24th, and each concert commences at 8:30 p.m.


The New York City Pavilion in the World's Fair is playing host to many more visitors this year as compared with last season, it was announced today by Park Commissioner Newbold Morris.


This is a 2,000 daily average increase and indicates the Pavilion will far exceed in 1965 the splendid attendance of 1,117,600 during the 1964 season.

MONDAYS, WEDNESDAY and FRIDAYS - 10 A.M. to NOON (Additional time may be granted, if needed)

TEST NUMBER I for JUNIOR SWIMMERS - July 5th through July 30th

(Each student must attend a minimum of 10 lessons for beginners in order to be eligible to take this test).

1. Push off from side of pool and swim 50 feet, using American Crawl.

TEST NUMBER II for INTERMEDIATE SWIMMERS - August 2nd through August 20th

(Each student must attend a minimum of 6 lessons for novice swimmers to be eligible to take this test.)

- 1. Demonstrate a shallow dive from side of pool and swim 100 feet using American Crawl.
- 2. Push off from side of pool and swim 50 feet on back, using Scissor Kick and sculling motion with the hands.

TEST NUMBER III for ADVANCED SWIMMERS - August 23rd to September 3rd

(Each student must attend a minimum of 6 lessons for Intermediate swimmers to be eligible to take this test.)

- 1. Dive in and swim 50 yards, using the American Crawl.
- 2. Demonstrate correct racing turn against side of pool.
- 3. Push off from side of pool and swim 100 feet, using Backstroke with regular overarm recovery.

DEPARTMENT OF PARKS LEARN-TO-SWIM PROGRAM - BEGINNERS

The teaching of the non-swimmer is the most difficult of all teaching This is why it is important to spend as much time as needed for the teaching of the non-swimmers.

If the student can pass the beginner's course in a satisfactory manner, then all other swimming courses will come easy to him. It is also important for the instructor to equip the student with basic water safety skill and knowledge in order to make the student feel safe while in or about the water.

- 1. Resting and floating position
- 2. Release of cramp
- 3. Reaching assistance
- 4. Throwing assistance
- 5. Assisting, using free floating objects
- 6. You may also explain the purpose and use of artificial respiration

Instructor should work the class on a schedule basis (for example -3 one-half hour classes - 10 minutes instruction - 5 minutes free swim) This is left up to the discretion of the instructor.

Test for Park Department Emblem

 - b. Changing direction

 - d. Reaching assistance

 - a. Jump into shallow water
 - b. Jump into deep water
 - c. Diving into deep water (Make sure 1 lifeguard is in the water when performing this act) This is to give the student more confidence in himself.

DEPARTMENT OF PARKS LEARN-TO-SWIM PROGRAM (CON'T)

FORMULA WHEN TEACHING SKILLS

SKILL PROCEDURE

Walking and submerging in water

Join hands, walk, and bob up and down to shoulder level. (Instructor usually at midpoint of line.) (Water should not be deeper than neck depth for the smallest person in class.)

Mouth Breathing

Inhale and exhale through mouth. Keep breathing continuously. Do not hold breath

Breath holding

Inhale. Lower face in water and hold breath. Stay under a minimum of 10 seconds and exhale. (Place face in water by bending forward at waist. Open eyes if possible. Bend knees and place arms on knees.)

Rhythmic breathing

Play games.

Prone float

Buddies face each other. One buddy does jellyfish float and extends arms forward and legs back. Other buddy supports hands during prone float position. Recover by going back to jellyfish float. Concentrate on regaining a standing position.

Back float

Buddies stand facing same direction. Buddy in front assumes back float position, supported by partner. Recover to standing position by dropping hips, scooping arms forward, and drawing the knees up. Assume back float position by submerging until shoulders go below surface. Extend arms to sides, palms up and head back. Slowly lift hips toward surface.

Rhythmic breathing

Inhale when above surface; exhale when below surface.

Release of cramp

Assume jellyfish float position, and practice release of cramp from calf of leg and in foot. (Introduce this technique before allowing students to venture into deep water.)

Prone glide

Push from side or bottom into prone glide. Recover to standing position as in prone float. Keep face in water on glide.

Prone kick glide

Life face down. Practice flutter kick. (On deck, have student extend legs over side.) Keep legs straight but not stiff. Practice kick while supported by buddy or while holding onto trough.

Back glide

Push from bottom or from side of pool. Recover as in back float.

Back kick glide

Lie face up. Practice flutter kick. Practice kick while supported.

Arm movement on back finning

Lie on back and practice finning. Do not use legs. practice until able to move 3 body lengths. Do not use legs.

SKILL

PROCEDURE

Arm stroke on front human stroke

Practice human stroke. Practice stroke while standing. Keep arms below surface. Practice stroke while walking. Keep face above surface. Practice stroke. Continue until able to do at least 5 body lengths. Keep face above surface. Practice stroke. Allow legs to dangle without conscious effort to move them. Concentrate on extending the arms forward, keeping each arm in line with the eye on that side. Press toward center line of body.

NOTE: THE ELEMENTARY HAND-OVER-HAND ARM MOVEMENT MAY BE INTRODUCED AT THIS TIME IF DEEMED ADVISABLE.

Combined stroke on the front

Practice arm and leg movements. Maintain good body position. Continue until able to do at least 5 body lengths. Practice arm and leg stroke. Continue until able to do 5 body lengths. Practice breathing. Stand, bend forward, place left or right ear in water, exhale. Continue in rhythm. Add arm stroke to breathing. Remain stationary and practice arm stroke and breathing. Walk and combine arm stroke with breathing. Do prone glide. Add arm stroke and breathing. Do not kick. Practice complete stroke. Turn head, do not lift head. Continue without break in breathing pattern. Keep arms under water at all times.

Turning over front to

Swim human stroke. On signal, turn over to back. Swim on back and back to front back. On signal, turn to front.

Changing directions

Swim human stroke. On signal, reach to left, turn head to left, and swim to left. On signal, do same to right. Keep hands under water at all times.

Leveling off

Start in vertical position, and with a little thrust from bottom, swim to a face-down level position.

Reaching assists

One buddy on deck, other in shallow water. Practice extension of arm and leg to assist buddy. One buddy on deck, other in deep water. Practice extending arm and leg to assist buddy. One buddy in water, other on deck. Practice with long reaching pole and a towel.

Standing jump into shallow water

Jump and spring forward as toes touch bottom. (Work on getting into swimming position after jump.) Guard against possibility of injury to feet as a result of jumping.

Diving

Practice until procedure is mastered. Use progression: sit, kneel, semi-deep knee bend, stand.

Standing jump into deep water

Jump, level off, and swim to nearest point of safety.

The accessibility of Staten Island brought about by the opening of the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge, has made Staten Island parks readily available to the people of Brooklyn and Queens; also, the building program has brought new residents to the Island. the impact of these two factors was evident by the increased use of the parks and recreation areas.

A record was established on Staten Island, having its largest single audience at a concert when 20,000 attended one of the Philharmonic Concerts in Clove Lakes park.

Commissioner Morris states that the demand for park facilities will continue to increase with the anticipated population growth of the Island. Every effort should be expended now to acquire and set aside open land for this future population growth.

At beaches in Great Kills Park, Wolfe's Pond Park, and South Beach, to date a total of 153,007 cars were parked in 1965 at these facilities, compared to 123,260 cars parked in 1964. This represents an increase of 30,747 or an average percentage increase of 25%.

To date at La Tourette and Silver Lake Courses, 114,694 rounds of golf were played in 1965, compared to 101,216 played in 1964. This represents an increase of 13,478 rounds, or an average percentage increase of 13%.

STATEMENT BY NEWBOLD MORRIS REGARDING RULES AND REGULATIONS - DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AFFECTING CONDUCT OF CANDIDATES FOR PUBLIC OFFICE IN PUBLIC PARKS

The Charter of the City of New York charges the Commissioner of Parks with responsibility for the management and care of park property, including streets adjoining a public park. The Commissioner is authorized to establish and enforce rules and regulations for the governing and protection of public parks - which rules and regulations shall have the force and effect of law. The Charter also provides that violations of these rules shall be tried by a City Magistrate and punishable by not more than 30 days imprisonment or a fine of \$50, or by both.

The purpose behind these Charter provisions is obviously to guarantee to our fellow citizens their right to quiet enjoyment of park facilities.

This year, some over-zealous campaign managers have requested permits for political activity on park property. These requests have been denied because, families and individuals sitting in park areas seeking relaxation and relief from the noises and other distractions of a busy city, should not be made a "captive audience". So, I have requested the Police Department to rigidly enforce Section 6 of the Regulations of the Department of Parks, which provides in part as follows: "No person shall distribute, display, transport, carry or construct any flag, banner, sign, emblem, model, device, pictorial representation, or other matter, within any park or park-street, for advertising or political purposes;" also, Section 7 which provides that no person shall "act as crier, or advertiser, through the media of voice, public address system, or other mechanical device in parks, park streets, beaches or boardwalks or in the vicinity of same".

We have, however, designated thirteen forum areas throughout the five boroughs at which locations any candidate may request a permit to hold a full blown rally or political program.

This 1965 municipal campaign has gotten under way much earlier than such campaigns usually start. Without permits, candidates are visiting public beaches and neighborhood parks where crowds congregate. Reports come to me every Monday of violations by automobiles carrying signs, banners, portable bull horns and other sound equipment - through which the candidate's name is blared. Park supervisors have politely informed these political supporters that they were at the time violating park rules and invading the peace and quiet which park users are entitled to expect. In every instance the remonstrances were ignored.

One Saturday, a candidate paraded himself on the Park Department's boardwalk at Rockaway Beach - preceded by boys carrying posters and accompanied by two cars with loud speakers. One campaign manager came in to see me and asked to have a quiet sitting park set aside for a political rally. When that request was denied, he wanted permission to set up sound equipment on the street bordering the park over which the Park Department has jurisdiction. When that also was denied , he said he would have to proceed anyway, and would just pay the fines as he received

the summonses.

This willful disregard of long-standing park rules and regulations formulated in the cause of decency is disturbing when displayed by men seeking the great responsibility of governing this city. I believe that if the public understands the reasons for our policies, which have been in existence for many years, candidates will reconsider whatever programs have been planned involving the use of park property and park streets for political purposes.

Even without such rules, in my opinion it is a matter of bad taste and poor public relations to inflict oneself - along with raucous noise - upon people without their consent whether on a public street or in a park.

We do not have any rule against a candidate quietly circulating among crowds offering to shake hands with prospective voters. Having been a candidate myself on seven occasions; I can testify to the fact that every hand the candidate shakes does not mean a vote. I am merely asking the walking candidates to restrict their own activities and that of their entourages when they reach park property. We will not permit bull horns, sound equipment, banners, placards and ribbons, or the distribution of pamphlets or brochures which result in heavy littering and additional maintenance work when we are already so shorthanded. The walking candidate will not be permitted to make a formal political speech. We are confident that the public will support our efforts to prevent their own exploitation.

Applications soon will be available to individuals interested in applying for the temporary positions of seasonal parkmen, seasonal park helpers and playground assistants, it was announced today by Park Commissioner Newbold Morris.

Beginning DECEMBER 27, applications for these non-competitive positions will be issued and received by the Department of Parks. No formal eligible list will result from the receipt of the applications.

Commissioner Morris says that applicants for seasonal employment will be considered in the order of filing applications. However, primary consideration will be given to applicants who had been previously employed by the Park Department and had performed satisfactory service.

During the week of DECEMBER 27, 1965 through DECEMBER 31, 1965, the applications will be issued and received ONLY at the Brooklyn War Memorial Recreation Center, located in Cadman Plaza. Thereafter, from JANUARY 2, 1966 through FEBRUARY 11, 1964, the applications will be issued and received at the Department of Parks main office in each of the five boroughs.

"Letters of recommendation are unnecessary," adds the Commissioner.

"Applicants will be considered on the basis of their prior service or qualifications."

Listed below are details relative to each seasonal position:

SEASONAL PARKMAN

SALARY AND VACANCIES: There are approximately 1,106 seasonal positions in the Department of Parks at salaries of \$12.00 per day. The employment period may extend from MARCH 15 to NOVEMBER 30 for a maximum of 200 days a year, not to exceed 6 days a week.

REQUIREMENTS: There are no formal educational or experience requirements for this position. This job requires extraordinary physical effort,

Applicants will be required to be in good physical condition.

<u>DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES</u>: Under close supervision performs general park maintenance work at any park area, facility or building during seasonal operations, perform related work as required.

AGE: Open only to persons who have passed their 18th birthday by the last date for filing of application but shall not have passed their 60th birthday on the first date for filing of applications.

SEASONAL PARK HELPER

This position is open to MEN and WOMEN.

SALARY AND VACANCIES: There are approximately 1,657 seasonal positions in the Department of Parks at salaries not to exceed \$12.00 per day.

The Employment Period may extend from APRIL 1 to NOVEMBER 30, 1966, for a maximum of 150 days a year, not to exceed 6 days a week.

REQUIREMENTS: There are no formal education or experience requirements for this position. Applicants will be required to be in good physical condition.

Douglas Leigh, president of MAKE NEW YORK BEAUTIFUL, INC. and noted for his creation of water and electrical displays, is responsible for the fountain's engineering and design. Private water for the fountain dedication has been trucked in and paid for by Mr. Delacorte.

The fountain is the first stage in the overall beautification of Columbus Circle. The second stage calls for turning the Circle into an Italian-style piazza; Edward Durell Stone, the well-known architect, has made the design. The third stage calls for landscaping and illuminating Broadway from Columbus Circle to Lincoln Center.

Stages two and three are expected to cost \$1.15 million. A general committee of MAKE NEW YORK BEAUTIFUL, INC. has been formed to raise a special private fund to help defray the cost and expense: of these improvements.

Applications are available for the Municipal Lifeguard Training Course which is conducted each year by the Department of Parks to prepare men for the position of Lifeguard at New York City's municipal pools and beaches, it was announced today by Park Commissioner Newbold Morris.

Tuition is free and the course consists of practical and theoretical instruction in lifesaving skills, water safety, rescue techniques and other procedures and practices taught by special Park Department instructors.

Applicants must be male citizens of the United States who will have reached their 17th birthday on the day of appointment and can pass a non-competitive free-style swimming test of 50 yards in 35 seconds. The minimum height and weight requirements are 5'7" and 135 lbs., at time of registration. Candidates will not be considered eligible for appointment if they have reached their 35th birthday.

Applications are available to the end of December at all public, private and parochial and Hebrew high schools, university and college placement offices; all YMCA, YMHA, and Red Cross Chapter offices; also, at all borough offices of the Department of Parks. Applications will be accepted by the register clerk at East 54th Street Pool at 342 East 54th Street, Manhattan.

The instructive classes will begin early in January 1966, and enrollees will be required to attend 14 sessions (2 hours weekly) which will be held afternoons and evenings each weekday, and mornings and afternoons on Saturdays. Applicants will be given their choice of class periods.

Successful candidates will receive certificates of qualification at the termination of the course.

The Perkins Garden at Independence Avenue and West 252nd Street in Riverdale, Borough of the Bronx, today joined the distinguished group of City-supported quasi-public cultural institutions that include the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the New York Botanical Garden, the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences, and the American Museum of Natural History, when Newbold Morris, Commissioner of Parks, executed an Agreement on November 4, 1965, with Wave Hill Incorporated, for the maintenance and operation of the former private estate. The property was deeded to the City of New York by the Perkins family for the purpose of maintaining and operating an arboretum, to be known as the Perkins Garden.

The Perkins Garden consists of twenty beautifully landscaped acres and two stately residences, "Glyndor" and "Wave Hill" with their dependencies, commanding superb views of the Hudson River and the Palisades. "Glyndor," which was the home of the late Mrs. George W. Perkins, Sr., will be internally reconstructed to house a new Environmental Science Center. The other residence, "Wave Hill," the former home of Mr. and Mrs. Edward W. Freeman, will be adapted for use as a new Arts and Cultural Center. "Wave Hill" is a City landmark that has been occupied during its long and colorful history by such personages as Mark Twain and Arturo Toscanini and by the Queen Mother Elizabeth during a visit to New York when the house was the residence of Sir Pierson Dixon, then British Ambassador to the United

Nations. A great armor hall was added during the residence of the late
Bashford Dean, an outstanding collector and scholar of medieval and
renaissance arms and armor. The hall will be used by the Arts and Cultural
Center as a small theatre with facilities for chamber music concerts,
recitals, lectures, films and similar cultural activities.

At a ceremony at the Perkins Garden this morning Commissioner

Morris signed the agreement on behalf of the City and announced that the
northerly portion of Riverdale Park, known as the "Park-along-the-Hudson"

and adjoining the Perkins Garden to the west, would be utilized by Wave

Hill Incorporated and the Environmental Science Center for nature studies.

He added that the Environmental Science Center would afford the City's

urban population a unique opportunity to observe, study and enjoy wild life

in natural surroundings within the city limits, and constituted a particu
larly appropriate way to perpetuate the long and active interest in native

conservation evidenced by the lives of the late George W. Perkins and his

son, the late George W. Perkins, Jr.

The Environmental Science Center is a direct outgrowth, and will be an expansion, of the natural science program conducted by the Riverdale Outdoor Laboratories. The program has been sponsored by the Riverdale Community Planning Association, Inc., and financed by that Association and by the Conservation Foundation, the Dodge Foundation, the Fellowship Foundation and the Scherman Foundation. It has been directed by Mrs. Byard Williams who will act as consultant to the Environmental Science Center.

The program at the Environmental Science Center will include intraining courses for teachers offered in cooperation with colleges and universities in the City of New York, and also provide for in-service credit for teachers and summer research facilities for junior high school students. Certain science activities will also be coordinated within City schools to stimulate natural science studies. It will be financed by a substantial grant from the Old Dominion Foundation which will cover the Center's expenses for its first three years of operation.

The Perkins Garden will be operated by Wave Hill Incorporated, a newly constituted non-profit membership corporation, in a manner similar to the New York Botanical Garden, the Bronx Zoo, the Brooklyn Botanic Garden and the other quasi-public cultural institutions which occupy park property and receive both City and private financial support. Private support will include the income from a \$500,000 trust fund established by the Perkins and Freeman families to assist in the upkeep and programs of the Perkins Garden. The grounds and the two residences will be renovated and adapted by the City for their new uses. It is expected that the reconstruction necessary to provide for the Environmental Science Center in "Glyndor" will be completed by the end of the year 1966, and similar reconstruction for the Arts and Cultural Center in "Wave Hill" will be finished by December, 1967.

The Directors of Wave Hill Incorporated will include three city officials ex-officio: the Mayor, the Borough President of the Bronx and the
Commissioner of Parks. Other directors will be Gilbert Kerlin, President of
The Riverdale Community Planning Association, John Mack, a Vice President of
the same Association, representatives of donor organizations and leaders in
science, the cultural arts and the community. Mr. Kerlin and Mr. Mack have
been working directly with the Department of Parks over an extended period of
time to bring the Perkins Garden development and program into being.

At the agreement-signing ceremony Commissioner Morris stated:

"The City of New York and the Park Department are deeply grateful to the Perkins and Freeman families for making possible this splendid addition to the City's recreational and educational facilities, and to my predecessor, Robert Moses, whose long friendship and close association with Mr. George Perkins, Sr., and with his son, enabled him to encourage so actively their generous and public-spirited gift. I also wish to thank Mr. Kerlin, Mr. Mack, Mrs. Byard Williams, many officials of other City agencies and all those civic-minded leaders and residents of Riverdale who have devoted so much time, thought and energy in an outstanding spirit of cooperation with the Park Department in working out the many details involved in getting a new cultural institution such as this successfully under way."

An announcement will be made when the facility is available for public use.

STATEMENT BY NEWBOLD MORRIS, COMMISSIONER OF PARKS, AT DEPARTMENTAL HEARING BEFORE CITY PLANNING COMMISSION ON 1966-67 CAPITAL BUDGET REQUEST, OCTOBER 25, 1965

The total amount requested by the Park Department for capital improvements in 1966-67 is \$32,812,380.41 in City funds plus a little over \$8,000,000 from other sources such as the State and Federal governments and private contributions.

This Capital Budget request is the first one which reflects the new Federal legislation which will provide funds matching those provided by the City for development of outdoor recreation facilities. Also included in our request, although this will be subject to favorable action by the State Legislature and voters, is State aid for outdoor recreation projects which is to match combined Federal and City funds starting in January of 1967. The total State aid proposed for the City of New York under this program is \$25,007,000 which with an additional 25% in matching funds from both the City and Federal governments results in a tem-year New York City Park Department program for outdoor recreation totalling \$50,000,000. We propose to use \$1,500,007 per annum for acquisition (Project P-56) and \$3,500,000 annually for park development (various projects). Acquisition will concentrate on providing parks in those areas now either completely lacking in such facilities

or inadequately provided with them. Development funds received under this

Federal-State-City outdoor recreation program will be used for both small and

large parks in all five boroughs.

Federal and State aid for elimination of water pollution will no doubt make it possible for New York City to accelerate that program and thus enable this department to develop some of the waterfront parks and beaches at an earlier date than is now indicated in our present program. The N. Y. State program of one billion dollars will be voted on by the public on Election Day, November 2, 1965.

Construction funds for two outdoor swimming pools are included in our request. One is to be located in Baisley Park, Queens, and the other in Brooklyn at Marcy Avenue, Kosciusko Street and DeKalb Avenue. In both cases we plan to make winter recreation use of the buildings.

Our request under Project P-127 is for \$4,000,000 for the design and construction of thirty-two school playgrounds in all five boroughs. We are also requesting \$4,000,000 under Project P-245 for Parks, Parkways and Playgrounds, Construction and Reconstruction. As usual, too large a percentage of this will have to be used to replace park facilities destroyed or damaged annually by vandals, rather than to rehabilitate, improve or augment existing facilities.

Project P-513 is for removal of dead, dying and Dutch Elm diseased trees. The amount requested may have to be increased further because of the effect of another year of drought on street and park trees.

Under Project P-536 we are requesting construction funds for Mullaly Park Ice Skating Rink, the Bronx. When this rink and the Cleve Lakes

Park Skating Rink in Staten Island are completed, each of the five boroughs will have at least one artificial skating rink.

Project P-394 is for the first stage of development of the Seton Hospital side at 232nd Street and Independence Avenue, the Bronx.

Project P-499, Coney Island Skating Rink which is included in our request for Construction funds will have year-round use — in winter for ice skating and in summer for conventions, meetings and other events and activities. The project includes parking facilities.

City funds in the amount of \$1,911,700 and \$150,000 private funds are

City funds in the amount of \$1,911,700 and \$150,000 private funds are being requested under Project P-526 for construction at Mt. Morris Park. This is an urgently needed project which includes a new Recreation Center, a band-shell and stage and provides for rehabilitation and improvement of the balance of the park. The \$150,000 in private funds is a contribution by Richard Rodgers toward the cost of the bandshell and stage.

Among other items four new neighborhood parks and playgrounds have been included in our request for Richmond. This rapidly developing borough will need more of these as the open spaces disappear and we expect to provide them.

I trust the members of the City Planning Commission will agree with us that each project included in our request has merit and will warrant your approval. We owe it to the citizens of New York City, both young and old, to provide all the recreation facilities needed to promote health and happiness.
