A communication was received from his Honor the Mayor, transmitting letter with newspaper clipping of alleged remarks of Henry Steinert, Esq., City Magistrate, in discharging prisoners arrested for sleeping on the grass in Tompkins Square Park, characterizing the Park Department rules as "idiotic."

Debate was had thereon, all of the Commissioners expressing opinions in the matter; and it was, on motion,

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Board be directed to reply to the Mayor, respectfully acknowledging the receipt of the letter and clipping, and saying further:

That the ordinances for the government of the parks of The City of New York, having been duly passed pursuant to the provisions of law, after careful consideration of the actual needs of these parks as important and popular institutions, stand for enforcement before the constituted authorities for their own value and utility as well as for their share in the general scheme of law and order.

That any hasty and ill-considered criticism of these ordinances by conspicuous representatives of the constituted authorities would seem to be calculated to do great injury to the people's parks, as well as to be generally subversive of law and order.

That the public use of some of the lawns, especially in Central Park, and the smaller parks in the Borough of Manhattan, must be carefully restricted and made dependent upon conditions of weather and of the growth and strength of the grass, or they would become waste places, and the public dissatisfaction and criticism against this Department would be a hundredfold greater than that which is alleged in this case.

That the Park Department has always, under conditions of protracted, excessive and oppressive hot weather, thrown open the lawns in the parks to the people, wherever possible, even to the extent of allowing them to be used as sleeping places at night, despite the fact that great damage has always resulted from this use, and much difficulty has always been found in re-establishing the necessary restrictions.

That the experiments of using the public parks for sleeping places had been somewhat criticised by sociologists, who give careful and unselfish attention to the moral and general well-being of the dwellers in the City's most congested quarters.

That many of our physicians of standing declared it to be a doubtful kindness to permit hundreds of unaccustomed men, women and children to sleep on the bare ground in the parks, as many of them do. The temporary relief from the hot and unventilated quarters of even the most dangerously crowded tenements may be too dearly purchased at the expense of sickness, disability and death from exposure. Even in the absence of a sudden change of the weather, that must always be apprehended, the practice is attended with danger.

From Corporation Counsel—

“Hon. MICHAEL J. KENNEDY:

“Sir—I am in receipt of your communication dated July 16, 1906, which reads as follows:

“A number of large sight-seeing automobiles and automobile stages use the roads in Prospect Park and the main drive of the Ocean parkway as part of their routes. Most of these vehicles have regularly advertised tours from stated places in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn to Coney Island and other points traversing the above parkways. They charge a fixed price for the transportation of passengers for the round trip. The number has increased to such an extent that it has become a nuisance. Not only do these automobiles (some of which carry upward of thirty passengers) interfere with the use of the driveways by the general public, but on account of their weight, the same being from five to nine tons, destroy the roadways. Section 19 of the Ordinance of the Department of Parks provides as follows:

““No automobile, stage or other vehicle shall be allowed to carry passengers for hire over or upon any of the parks, parkways or drives, concourses, plazas, or circles under the control of the Department of Parks, excepting upon traffic roads and except by special permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction.”

“Will you please advise me at your earliest convenience as to my powers to regulate such traffic?”

“In my opinion you are authorized, under the Ordinances of the Department of Parks, to regulate the traffic mentioned in your letter, and, if necessary, forbid the admission of such automobiles upon traffic roads under your jurisdiction.
