The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

A communication was received from the Consulting Engineer of the Borough of Manhattan forwarding for the approval of this Department a copy of proposed ordinance to regulate the opening and restoration of street pavements prepared by the Board of Consulting Engineers in a form calculated to conform substantially with the joint views of said Board and the Commissioners of this Department. On motion of Commissioner Kennedy the Secretary was instructed to advise the Board of Consulting Engineers that the ordinance in the form prepared meets with the approval of this Board excepting as it relates in section 17 to the storage of building or other materials on streets and to request the Consulting Engineers to so amend section 17 as to require that in all parkways, streets and avenues under the jurisdiction of this Department the roadways *shall* be properly protected by planking before materials are stored thereon.

Commissioner Kennedy brought to the attention of the Board the matter of certain resolutions proposed for adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the purpose of securing co-operation between the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and the various city officials who have jurisdiction over the paving, repaving, etc., of city streets, avenues, parkways, etc., and stated that he had been requested by the Board of Consulting Engineers of The City to examine the draft of resolutions as submitted and suggest any changes in the form as may seem advisable to affect the desired end. A draft of the resolutions was then read and considered, whereupon, on motion of Commissioner Kennedy, the matter was referred to the Committee of Chief Engineers and Superintendents of the Department to confer with the Board of Consulting Engineers and suggest to said Board any changes in the form of said resolutions as the Committee may deem proper.

Whereas, The Trustees of said association, at their annual meeting, held February 24, 1910, adopted the following resolution:

“Resolved, That this association hereby sets apart the sum of \$2,000 from its income of \$7,000 for the year 1910 for the creation of a fund for the purchase and erection in the Tomb of General Grant of such stained glass windows as may be approved as to design and ordered by the Executive Committee of this association, all subject to the approval of the Commissioners of Public Parks of The City of New York,” and

Whereas, This Board approves of setting aside the sum of \$2,000 for the creation of a fund for the purchase and erection of suitable stained glass windows in the said Tomb of General Grant; now, therefore, be it

In view of the public discussion on the resolution I am about to introduce, and the misstatements which have appeared over various signatures, I wish to publish the following reasons for requesting an inquiry by the Commissioner of Accounts into the allegations regarding the landscape architect, and the value and efficiency of his services for the Park Department:

1. The recommendations which he has proposed to me for Central Park and the parks generally of Manhattan have been but few and of little value.

2. Instead of furnishing me with the host of suggestions and plans for park improvements which their present condition demands, he rather has been more active in opposing those which I have made.

3. Conceding that my suggestions have not been such as a landscape architect should make, he has contributed but little of real value toward the maintenance and administration of the vast park grounds, for which I am responsible.

4. Under his guidance, I was led to present to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a request for an appropriation of \$1,250,000 for the restoration of Central Park, which on second consideration was found so lacking in supporting data, that

I have requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to withhold action until I am able to present to it a reliable statement of the park's needs to be furnished by the Federal Government expert, Mr. G. B. Maynardier.

5. Mr. Parsons' services to other cities are not relative to the fact that Central Park has been allowed by him to deteriorate for want of the kind of attention our own park architect should have given.

6. That Mr. Parsons' 29 per cent. of absence from duty is not a slight matter appears from the fact that he has recorded himself as "excused" and from the condition of the parks which for their restoration demand from him and all of us even more than a full day's time and work.

Commissioner Stover then offered the following:

Resolved, That Samuel Parsons, Jr., be and he hereby is discharged from the position of Landscape Architect to the Park Board for the good of the service.

On motion, further consideration of the matter was laid over pending investigation and report in relation thereto to be made by the Commissioners of Accounts by the following vote:

The President placed before the Board the following communication from His Honor the Mayor:

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, May 11, 1911.

Sir—I enclose to you, for the information of the Park Board, the report of the Commissioner of Accounts, recommending that Mr. Parsons be dismissed from the Department of Parks as landscape architect. I approve of his recommendation. His report is made after a full investigation. Mr. Parsons was present at the investigation, was represented by counsel, was examined as a witness, and was given opportunity to submit any evidence he saw fit. He did submit evidence in his behalf. The case is now therefore complete and ready for the Board's vote. It is very important that this office be filled by a man of suitable technical education, of good executive ability, and of a subordinate disposition.

CHARLES B. STOVER, Esq., President of the Park Board.

Commissioner Stover called up the following resolution offered by him and laid over on the 6th ultimo, and moved its adoption:

Resolved, That Samuel Parsons be and he hereby is discharged from the position of Landscape Architect to the Park Board for the good of the service.

Mr. Andrew D. Parker, counsel for Mr. Parsons, appeared and asked that action be deferred for one week to enable Mr. Parsons to obtain a copy of the testimony and make reply to the accusations against him.

Mr. Gutzon Borglum also appeared and asked that Mr. Parsons be afforded sufficient time to examine the testimony against him and to prepare and present his answer thereto.

The matter was then debated, whereupon the President announced that a recess would be taken until eight o'clock p. m., and that further consideration of the subject under discussion would be postponed until that time when opportunity would be afforded Mr. Parsons to make such reply to the report of the Commissioner of Accounts as he might desire.

Mr. Parker stated that the time intervening would be inadequate for the purpose, but that his client would be present at that time.

On motion, at 4.50 p. m., a recess was taken until 8 p. m.

At 8 p. m. the Board reconvened.

Mr. Parker again appeared on behalf of Mr. Parsons and stated that he had obtained at six o'clock a copy of the testimony taken by the Commissioner of Accounts; that he had been able to make only a cursory examination, but in so doing he had found that on several points the findings of the report were not supported by the testimony, and again asked for time to enable a full examination of the testimony and the preparation of a reply based thereon.

The President and counsel then discussed parts of the testimony in question. The President stated that Mr. Parsons had been given a hearing and had had ample opportunity for presenting any evidence he might desire in his own behalf before the Commissioner of Accounts.

Mr. Parker then stated that Mr. Parsons would be unable, in the time afforded, to do more than make a general denial of any wrongdoing in office.

Commissioner Stover then renewed his motion for the adoption of the resolution as offered by him.

The question being put as to whether the Board would adopt said resolution, it was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Stover, Higgins—2.

No—Commissioner Kennedy.

In explanation of his vote, Commissioner Kennedy said:

I desire to say that in the report of the Commissioner of Accounts it is stated in the testimony that I was satisfied with the work of Mr. Parsons; I did so state under examination, and I repeat that it was the truth then, and it is the truth now. Since I became Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens on January 1, 1904. I have consulted the Landscape Architect in all matters requiring his assent under the City Charter, and in every instance have followed his suggestions in all improvements of the parks under my charge, and have found his advice and assistance of great value as the present condition of the parks in Brooklyn and Queens will testify to. In consideration of these facts, I vote *no*.

Whereas, The Hon. Henry S. Thompson, Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of The City of New York, did, in pursuance of section 205 of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, as amended, and of section 3 of chapter 178 of the Laws of 1911, designate, under date of August 5, 1911, that parts of lands heretofore reserved for the Prospect Hill Reservoir, in the Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, are no longer needed for reservoir purposes, as follows:

“Know All Men by These Presents, This is to certify that I, Henry S. Thompson, Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of the City of New York, in pursuance of Section 205 of Chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901 as amended, and of Section 3 of Chapter 178 of the Laws of 1911, have designated and do hereby designate that part of the lands heretofore reserved for the Prospect Hill Reservoir, in the Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, as no longer needed for Reservoir purposes, which is bounded as follows:—

“Second Parcel. Beginning at the southwesterly corner of Grand Avenue and Sackett Street, as formerly laid out on the Commissioner’s map of the County of Kings and continuing in a westerly direction along the southerly side of Sackett Street 250 feet to a point; thence northerly and parallel to Grand Avenue to a point on the southerly side of the Eastern Parkway; thence in an easterly direction along the southerly side of the Eastern Parkway to its intersection with the westerly side of Grand Avenue; thence southerly along the westerly side of Grand Avenue 18 feet to the point of beginning.

"2nd: The Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, intends to erect an office and tool house approximately 20' x 30' at a location to be hereafter designated by the Commissioner of said Department, and the right is hereby reserved, therefore, to use any portion of the lands herein designated and described and to be assigned to the Park Department, that the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity may consider necessary for the erection of said office and tool house.

"3rd: The lands to be assigned to the Department of Parks shall be re-assigned to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity upon the certification of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that said lands are needed for the extension or improvement of the water supply system.

"4th: No buildings shall be erected by the Department of Parks on any of the lands hereby assigned, without the written consent of the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

And, Whereas, Section 3 of Chapter 178 of the Laws of 1911, provides that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York, on the recommendation of the Board of Park Commissioners of said city, is authorized in its discretion to amend the agreement already existing between said city and the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences, as authorized by Chapter 618 of the Laws of 1906, or to enter into a supplementary agreement or agreements altering the boundaries of said Botanic Garden and Arboretum so as to include any portion of the lands now or hereafter reserved for the Prospect Hill Reservoir which may be from time to time designated by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity as no longer needed for reservoir purposes and said Chapter 178 of the Laws of 1911 contemplates the administration of lands, thus designated, by the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences as a part of the Brooklyn Botanic Garden, and

Whereas the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences, through its Board of Trustees, has signified that the said designation by the said Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and the terms and conditions under which said designation is made are satisfactory to it, as set forth in the following letter:

Thompson, Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of the City of New York, as made by him under date of August 5th, 1911, in pursuance of Section 205 of Chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, as amended, and of Section 3, of Chapter 178 of the Laws of 1911, and that the terms and conditions as set forth in said designation are, so far as the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences and its Board of Trustees are concerned, satisfactory.

Resolved, That the Board of Park Commissioners of the City of New York recommends to the Sinking Fund Commission a transfer from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to the Department of Parks certain portions of the land reserved for the Prospect Hill Reservoir in the Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, as designated by Henry S. Thompson, Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of the City of New York, under date of August 5, 1911, as no longer needed for reservoir purposes, and bounded as follows:

First Parcel: Beginning at the southwesterly corner of old Grand avenue and Old Sackett street, as formerly laid out on the Commissioner's map of the County of Kings and continuing in a southerly direction along the west side of said Grand avenue to the northerly side of old President street, as formerly laid out on said map, for a distance of 594 feet, more or less; thence in a westerly direction along the northerly side of said old President street to the easterly side of Flatbush avenue 725 feet, more or less; thence northerly along the easterly side of Flatbush avenue for a distance of 27.94 feet, more or less, to a point where a line parallel to the northerly side of old President street and 20 feet north of said line intersects the easterly side of Flatbush avenue, and thence in an easterly direction along said line parallel to President street, to a point situated 20 feet from the northerly side of old President street, and 250 feet west of the westerly side of Grand avenue; and thence in a northerly direction parallel to the westerly side of said old Grand avenue, to the southerly side of old Sackett street, a distance of 574 feet; thence in an easterly direction along the southerly line of old Sackett street, a distance of 250 feet, to the westerly side of old Grand avenue at the point of beginning.
