I have requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to withhold action until I am able to present to it a reliable statement of the park's needs to be furnished by the Federal Government expert, Mr. G. B. Maynadier.

5. Mr. Parsons' services to other cities are not relative to the fact that Central Park has been allowed by him to deteriorate for want of the kind of attention our own park architect should have given.

6. That Mr. Parsons' 29 per cent. of absence from duty is not a slight matter appears from the fact that he has recorded himself as "excused" and from the condition of the parks which for their restoration demand from him and all of us even more than a full day's time and work.

position of Landscape Architect to the Park Board for the good of the service.

and regulation:

The use and occupation of the main drive of Ocean Boulevard in the Borough of Broklyn, from Twenty-second avenue to Kings Highway, is hereby restricted to horses and light carriages. Vehicles of all other kinds, including bicycles and motor vehicles are hereby excluded therefrom.

The Superintendent of Parks of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens is hereby directed to see that the foregoing rule and regulation is enforced.

Mr. Gutzon Borglum also appeared and asked that Mr. Parsons be afforded sufficient time to examine the testimony against him and to prepare and present his

answer thereto.

The matter was then debated, whereupon the President announced that a recess would be taken until eight o'clock p. m., and that further consideration of the subject under discussion would be postponed until that time when opportunity would be afforded Mr. Parsons to make such reply to the report of the Commissioner of Accounts as he might desire.

Mr. Parker stated that the time intervening would be inadequate for the purpose.

but that his client would be present at that time. On motion, at 4.50 p. m., a recess was taken until 8 p. m.

At 8 p. m. the Board reconvened.

Whereas, Pursuant to the agreement, dated October 7, 1908, made between the Park Board of the Department of Parks, of The City of New York, and the Grant Monument Association, relating to the care of the Tomb of General Grant, at Riverside drive, it is provided, among other things, that said Association shall improve the Tomb of General Grant; and

Whereas, The windows of the Tomb are plain glass windows and it is the opinion of the Trustees of the Grant Monument Association and of the members of this Board that a fund should be created with which to purchase and erect suitable stained

glass windows in the said Tomb; and Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has appropriated the sum

of \$7,000 for the care of the said Tomb for the year 1911; and

Whereas, The said contract provides for the payment by The City of New York to the said Association of the necessary expenses of maintaining said Tomb, including not only actual expenses, but also such sums as may be set apart by the Association for the creation of such fund as may be approved by said Association and the said Commissioners of Parks for any of the purposes referred to in said contract, not exceeding the sum of \$7,000 in any one year; and

Whereas, The Trustees of said Association, at their annual meeting, held Febru-

ary 28, 1911, adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Association hereby sets apart the sum of \$2,000 from its income of \$7,000 for the year 1911 for the creation of a fund for the purchase and erection in the Tomb of General Grant of such stained glass windows as may be approved as to design and ordered by the Executive Committee of this Association, all subject to the approval of the Commissioners of Parks of The City of New York;

Whereas, This Board approves of setting aside the sum of \$2,000 for the creation of a fund for the purchase and erection of suitable stained glass windows in the said

Tomb of General Grant; now, therefore, be it
Resolved, That this Board hereby approves of the payment by The City of New York to the Grant Monument Association of the sum of \$2,000 out of its appropriation of \$7,000 for the year 1911, for the creation of a fund with which to purchase and erect in the Tomb of General Grant such stained glass windows as may be approved and ordered by the Executive Committee of the Grant Monument Association.
