There being no objection, the President directed that the reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting be dispensed with.

There being no objection the President directed that the reading of the Minutes of the previous Meeting be dispensed with.

The Secretary read a certified copy of a resolution from the City Clerk, adopted by the Board of Aldermen on February 7th, 1922, relating to golf fees on the city links, which on motion of Commissioner Benninger was ordered on file.

The Secretary read a communication from the Standardization Committee, which had been considering the revision of Park Department contract provisions as follows:
"February 16, 1922.

To the Honorable Park Board of The City of New York, Municipal Building, New York City.

Gentlemen:

In Compliance with the resolution of your Board adopted August 4, 1921, reading as follows:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineers and Assistant Engineers of the Park Department be requested to confer on the subject of a revision of the contract provisions for asphalt paving and to report to the Board at their earliest convenience any change they consider to be advisable and give their reasons in full for the change, if any, with the view of making them as uniform as possible in all the boroughs,"

possible in all the boroughs," it is hereby reported that the Chief Engineers and Assistant Engineers of the Park Departments and the Landscape Architect of the Park Board have regularly met on Monday afternoons in the Brooklyn Park office and revised the contract forms which were in use, so as to have one standard contract form for all Park Departments, for the various classes of work. The said standard contract form is hereby respectfully submitted to your Board for its consideration, and, if satisfactory, for its submission to the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York, for approval before printing

approval before printing.

The elimination of all paragraphs relating to specific guarantees, submission of specific samples, etc., which paragraphs will hereafter be provided for in the special provisions of the specifications for each particular kind of work; also the simplification of any paragraphs which appeared to be ambiguous or indefinite as to their intent, such as the reading of the 5% additional work clause, the contract modification clause and the extra work clause, the sense and intent of which, as understood

by the Committee, have been re-written into new paragraphs which, it is believed,

more completely and definitely cover the subject.

The order of numerous paragraphs in the contracts where they related to the same subject, has beel changed so as to keep such paragraphs together. Other minor changes, such as phraseology, punctuation, etc., which did not change the sense of the paragraphs, were also made.

It was believed that General Provisions common to the specifications of each department should be standardized. This was done and they were included for

printing in the standard contract form.

In order that your Board may be fully informed as to the proper provisions for such paragraphs as were eliminated in relation to samples, guarantees, etc., a sheet is hereto attached showing the proposed uniform order of the Special Provisions of the

specifications for each department, which will hereafter be followed, if approved by your Board, in regard to such samples and guarantees, but which Special Provisions, it is believed, should not be included as part of the standard contract, for the reason that the wording of such Special Provisions will change for each class of work and according to the character of the samples required for submission and the items which will be under guarantee.

The Committee also believes that the standardization work should continue until such time as all specifications for work common to each department are standardized.

On the standardization of specifications, the Committee will again continue its meetings, beginning Monday, February 20th, unless otherwise directed by your Board. It is the sense of the Committee that with the submission of this contract form, general provisions and outline of proposed special provisions, and the proposed standardization of specifications, the resolution of August 4, 1921, will have been

complied with.
