The Hon. Board of Park Commissioners.

Sirs:—I hereby resign the position of Landscape Architect of the Park Board, as of April 30th.

I beg that you will consider this decision irrevocable. I have reached it with great regret after mature deliberation.

To do the work properly facilities are needed in the way of draughtsmen and assistants, such as are considered necessary even in a private office. These have not been available, and I feel that my professional reputation may suffer if I continue in the position of Landscape Architect thus handicapped.

The beauty of the original design of Central Park can only be preserved by following a careful plan for new work and for planting, yet there is no correct topographic map of the park. No plans are made for the planting to be done, nor is any program followed which might result in its restoration to the original state. Nor is it possible, under present conditions, for the Landscape Architect of the Park Board to make these plans or to have such a program followed.

The work of rehabilitation of lawns, following the excellent scheme of Prof. Maynadier, has not extended beyond the second season. It should be a continuous process.

I believe the position of Landscape Architect is an important one; that he should have sufficient help to prepare thoroughly studied plans in advance of their need; that he should have entire charge of all planting in each borough; that a regular procedure should be followed in regard to structures and monuments which have to be submitted to the Art Commission. The head of a department or bureau shall have power to employ the subordinates of such department or bureau upon any legal holiday or may employ them upon any such Saturday in excess of the legal day's work above prescribed, and may pay them compensation therefor at the rate of their usual wages or salaries. The provisions of this section shall apply to and include per diem employees, but shall not apply to the uniformed Police and Fire Departments.

This act shall take effect immediately.

On motion of Commissioner Eliot the provisions of the foregoing proposed ordinance were disapproved by the following vote:

AN ORDINANCE providing that provision shall be made in the annual budget for the employment of laborers and mechanics on a per annum basis and for the employment of temporary employees for a definite number of days per annum. Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. That all laborers and mechanics necessary to run the various Borough

and City departments shall be provided for in the annual budget on a per annum basis. Sec. 2. That all temporary employees be provided for in the annual budget on

the basis of so many days per annum.

Sec. 3. That temporary employees be appointed to vacancies on the per annum force as they occur, or as the departments expand.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

On motion of Commissioner Eliot, it was decided that, in the opinion of this Board, a per diem rate of pay of laborers and mechanics is the most advisable, by the following vote:

By the terms of said order it was provided that the defendants show cause at Special Term, Part I, in the County Court House, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 16th day of July, 1913, why said defendant should not, pending the trial and determination of the action, be enjoined and restrained from awarding the contract referred to in the complaint and moving papers.

The subject of the action is a contract for the paving of a portion of Riverside Drive, and the plaintiff sought to have the letting of said contract enjoined upon the ground that free and full competition was not allowed. The motion for injunction was argued on the 18th day of July, 1913, before Judge Philbin of the Supreme Court, New York County, and decision was reserved. Resolved, That the Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of Queens be authorized to re-advertise for proposals for doing the work.

A requisition for the purchase of lithos and blue prints for the office of the Landscape Architect at an estimated cost of \$10, chargeable to Park Board appropriations, was approved by the following vote:

Commissioner Eliot offered the following:

Resolved, That the members of the Park Board have learned with deep sorrow of the death on Wednesday, December 24th, 1913, after a lingering and painful illness, of Col. Clinton H. Smith, Secretary of the Board. Entering the service of the Park Department in 1879, and continuing until his death, he added to an unusually vigorous and well balanced mind and an attractive personality the advantages of a long experience and a remarkably retentive memory, all of which made him an encyclopedia of routine and of precedent in respect to all the activities of the Department and a conspicuous example of accuracy and efficiency in the performance of the duties of his office.

Resolved, That the foregoing be entered in full upon the minutes and that a copy thereof suitably engrossed be transmitted to the family of the deceased. Which was adopted by the following vote: Ayes—Commissioners Kennedy, Higgins, Eliot, La Roche—4.
