Suburban Rapid Transit Company-Construction of railways.

A petition was received from the Suburban Rapid Transit Company, asking the consent of the Department to the construction and operation of a railway or railways upon and along the route or routes fixed, determined and located by the Rapid Transit Commission, appointed June 16, 1881, under the provisions of chap. 606, Laws of 1875, and described as follows: Commencing on the southerly side of the Harlem river at Second avenue, opposite or nearly opposite to Lincoln avenue; thence over and across the Harlem river (on such a line and at such an elevation as shall conform to the requirements of law) to said Lincoln avenue; thence up the same to 138th street and Third or Fordham avenue;

thence over and along Third or Fordham avenue to the street known as College place, at Fordham; thence northerly through and along said street known as College place, to the southerly boundary line of the lands of St. John's College; thence through, along and over said St. John's College lands easterly from the Harlem Railroad lands, and distant not less than 25 feet nor more than 75 feet therefrom, over, along and through other lands and streets adjoining or contiguous to the Harlem Railroad Company's lands, and at a like distance therefrom, as varied and shown by the map and profile of L. D. V. Mason, Esq., engineer, to the southerly side of the Bronx river, with the construction of such bridge or part of a bridge across said river as may be necessary, so far as the jurisdiction of the Commission extends, as shown by the map and profile aforesaid, now on file with this Commission, dated August 23, 1881. And a branch of said route commencing at the intersection of Third avenue with 138th street, in the 23d Ward, and running thence westerly over and along and through said 138th street to the northerly and easterly side of the Harlem river. And that wherever either of the routes so fixed and determined crosses a street, avenue, place or lands, such route includes, and is intended to include, and shall be deemed to include, such crossing and so much of said street, avenue, place or lands as is there crossed, so as to allow and enable the construction of continuous and connected lines of railway along the route so crossing.

"Commissioner Olliffe presented a report in relation to the operation of the draw, etc., of the Third Avenue Bridge over the Harlem river and making several recommendations and suggestions as to its management, which was referred to the Treasurer to examine and report."

In Board, January 16, 1886:

"The Treasurer, to whom was referred the report of Commissioner Olliffe respecting the management of the Third Avenue Bridge over Harlem river, presented a report in relation to the same, making suggestions and recommendations for its future management by increasing the force of employees and providing with life-saving appliances.

Commissioner VIELE moved that the said report be accepted and the recommendations contained therein adopted, and ordered carried out without delay."

Adopted.

The Treasurer, to whom was referred the report of Commissioner Olliffe upon the management of the Third Avenue Bridge over the Harlem river, reports in relation thereto, as follows:

I have, in company with Mr. William E. Worthen, Consulting Engineer, and Mr. J. H. Van Riper, Mechanical Engineer of the Department, made a personal examination of the bridge structure and machinery. I have also considered the force employed upon it, the capacity of the bridge, and the demands thereupon, and recommend the adoption of the suggestions hereinafter contained, at the earliest possible moment.

I have, in my action upon this matter, been at all times fully aware of the importance of establishing and maintaining a service of the highest grade upon this bridge, in view of the great increase of population in the wide district north and east of it, and the fact that it now constitutes, and probably will, for some time to come, the sole outlet for such population. The location of the New York and Northern Railroad depots upon the river, above the bridge, will also doubtless greatly increase the business of the draw during the summer months; but the principal item for consideration in this particular is the large and growing number of sailing vessels and steam-craft which call upon the draw for thoroughfare.

Speaking first of the bridge structure, I would report that it has been the result of investigation that the main defect of the draw is its immense weight—three-fold what is necessary for a draw of this size, and subject to the demands put upon this.

The bridge was built at a period when the science of the construction of heavy draws was yet undeveloped, and the difficulty created by its extreme weight is, moreover, enhanced by the nature of the running machinery upon which it is set.

It is supported upon twelve cast-iron columns, six feet in diameter, filled with concrete, eleven columns being in the outer circle, and one in the centre. These columns are in good condition.

It revolves upon 90 wheels of cast-iron, weighing 400 pounds each. Notwithstanding the great weight and apparent strength of these wheels, the enormous mass of the drawbridge actually crushes them in a short space of time, rendering their renewal a frequent necessity.

The weight of the bridge is thrown entirely upon the outer wheels. In all draw-bridges constructed at the present day, the weight is thrown upon a central pivot—seen, for instance, by an examination of the Fourth and Eighth avenue bridges, where the outer wheels serve more particularly the purposes of a guard. By this arrangement the friction of movement is much lessened, and it has become an invariable principle in the construction of modern draw-bridges.

This difficulty of weight is perhaps impracticable of mitigation but by a most radical change in the construction of the bridge, except in the following particular: To produce an architectural effect, there have been, without exaggeration, 100 tons of metal placed upon the draw—a device which may give an air of solidity to the structure, but which in reality detracts materially from its strength. Your Committee would accordingly recommend, that so much as possible of this cumbersome material should be removed, with due regard to architectural effect, as it may be said that the draw-bridge is at present virtually breaking down under its own weight.

When the bridge was built, in 1868, it was worked by hydraulic engines, the pressure for which was obtained from the

Croton water. This system was found insufficient, and the present engines were substituted and supposed sufficient for every purpose required. At the time of their adoption, when the bridge was opened at comparatively long intervals, this supposition may have been in a great degree justified. But at the present time, when the draw is not infrequently opened four times in an hour, and the demands for ready passage over the bridge require a greater rapidity and promptness of motion, they are clearly insufficient to move the heavy mass of the draw without injury to themselves. Constant strains and breakages, necessitating continual repairs, are the result; and plans for a new boiler and double-acting engine, in accordance with recommendations, are now being prepared.

In addition to the consultation with Messrs. Worthen & Van Riper, I have also been in conference with Mr. Thomas F. Rowland, of the Continental Iron Works, who submits the accompanying report of an examination of the bridge machinery, pointing out its defects, and suggesting the most effectual remedies.

I further recommend that there be purchased four sets of life-saving appliances, similar in kind to those at the ferries in this city, to be placed, one at each end of the draw, in convenient and accessible positions.

Also that a windlass be arranged on the southeast end of the bridge, on the New York side, with a sufficient length of rope to attach to the end of the draw, so that the same may by this means be closed, in case of obstruction happening while open.

Also that another boat be purchased for the New York side, and the contrivances be arranged under the bridge, at both sides, so that the boats may be hoisted out of the water.

I have made examination, also, into the number and character of the force employed in the management and super-

vision of the bridge, and would recommend that its number be enlarged and its manner of service changed.

It consists at present of two engineers, two bridge-tenders, and two laborers—six persons in all. These are formed into two gangs of equal number, working in spells of eight hours each, or, in the aggregate, sixteen hours of the twenty-four, one gang working from 5 A. M. till 1 P. M., and the other from 1 P. M. till 9 P. M. For the remainder of the twenty-four hours, namely, from 9 P. M. to 5 A. M., the bridge is left entirely without protection or control; and even during the day time no provision is made for supplying the place of any of the employees in case of sickness, or other cause of absence—a serious objection in the case of the engineer.

This force may not have been inadequate in the state of affairs which prevailed in former years; but it certainly is inadequate now. The augmentation of traffic, before alluded to, the frequency of passage and the increase of population, both actual and prospective, in the adjoining district, all require a force better able to answer the incessant calls of commerce, and to insure more perfectly the safety of the passing public.

One of the most serious defects in the present arrangement, and one which should assuredly be remedied without delay, is that of leaving the bridge, practically for the whole night, without any supervision, and the refusing of ingress or egress through the draw during that time. Demands have of late frequently been made that the draw should be opened at all hours of the night for the passage of vessels, and doubts have been expressed of the right of the Department to keep the draw closed, in opposition to such demands, it having been asserted that the Commissioners would be liable to injunction for the maintenance of a nuisance, or an action at law for damages caused by delay. Demands of this sort having become quite frequent, the opinion of the Corporation Counsel was sought in the matter during the past summer. No answer to that request has as yet been received. There

seems to be but little law upon the subject, but the has informally declared Counsel Corporation opinion that the Department would be liable, if the delay occasioned by such non-opening amounts to a nuisance; and it may be questioned whether such a state of affairs will not supervene in the near future, considering the increase of commerce which demands thoroughfare through this bridge. Moreover, the safety of the considerable masses of shipping which are not infrequently clustered northwest of the bridge is greatly endangered by this condition of things. A fire originating in their midst would, unless promptly checked, cause great loss and disaster; and the desertion of the bridge through the whole night shuts out the possibility of the fire-boats coming quickly to the rescue.

For these among other reasons, I deem it advisable and necessary that the bridge should be constantly supervised, as well by night as by day; and for this, as well as for the proper fulfillment of the daily requirements of the bridge service, a larger force than the present will be requisite.

I recommend that the force to be employed should be constituted as follows:

Three (3) Engineers, at \$3 per day;

Three (3) Oilmen, at \$2.25 per day;

Six (6) Bridge-tenders, at \$2 per day, and

Three (3) Laborers, at \$1.76 per day;

Making in all fifteen persons; that these be divided into three gangs, consisting each of

- 1 Engineer,
- 1 Oilman,
- 2 Bridge-tenders, and
- 1 Laborer,

each gang to work a shift of eight hours, the day being divided into three such shifts. That the engineers shall be required to pass an examination, as to qualifications, before the local inspectors of the Police Department. That the oilmen shall be required to pass a similar examination, before

the same officers, for the purpose of receiving from them a certificate that they are thoroughly qualified, in case of emergency, to run an engine for a short period of time (in case of the absence of the engineer in charge, from sickness or other cause); that they shall be reckoned next to the engineers in the line of promotion, and that it shall be their duty to perform attend to the fires. and the usual of firemen, in connection with that oiling. the bridge-tenders and laborers shall, in view of their duties, be carefully chosen for their intelligence and sobriety; that the bridge-tenders shall be duly qualified by an examination made by the Superintendent of Parks and the Engineer of Construction, and shall be authorized to keep the peace and preserve order upon the bridge; and that it shall be their duty, as well as that of the laborers, to keep the bridge thoroughly clean and swept, and in good condition, to keep the boats in order, to inspect the life-saving appliances in each shift, and see that the same are in order and convenient, and to care generally for the safety of the traveling public. That the said bridge-tenders and laborers be required to wear a uniform dress, to be furnished by themselves, and hereafter to be designated by the Board; if your Committee might suggest, a uniform such as that worn by men of a like grade in the navy would be suitable, or a cap of navy pattern, and a roundabout and pants of some dark, durable material, such as cordurov.

Finally, your Committee would respectfully remind the Board that the reasons for these improvements and changes are many and imperative, and would earnestly recommend early action looking towards their consummation.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS, OFFICE OF THE TOPOGRAPHICAL ENGINEER, NEW YORK, September 15, 1886.

Mr. Charles De F. Burns, Secretary Department of Public Parks:

SIR—In accordance with the instructions contained in your letter of the 4th inst., I have the honor to send herewith estimates of the amount of money that will be required to carry on the works under my charge, during the year 1887, and to furnish the following in explanation of the items and of the amounts asked for:

The work embraces the upper end of the 12th Ward, north of 155th street, and the whole of the 23d and 24th Wards, comprising 14,292 acres, or about $57\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. of the entire city.

The appropriations are under the two heads, viz.:

I. Surveying, Laying-out and Monumenting and Preparing Tax Maps of the 23d and 24th Wards.

II. Surveys, Maps and Plans.

Considering the work separately under these two heads we have first—

Surveying.

1st. Surveys have to be made in connection with the work of monumenting, for the purpose of establishing monument points and determining their relative positions, distances between them, etc.

2d. Surveys have also to be made in connection with the work of preparing and completing the tax maps, for which location surveys are required of all property and lot lines, existing streets, roads, etc., and of all land-marks showing old farm lines and original sub-divisions of land, when this needed information is not shown on the contract and other maps in possession of the Department.

Laying-out.

This work is classed under three heads, as follows:

1st. Making maps showing streets, roads, etc., proposed to be laid out.

The Department of Public Parks is authorized and empowered to amend maps, plans and profiles, and lay out, alter and discontinue certain streets, avenues, roads, squares, public parks and places within several specified bounds, in accordance with the provisions of the following special acts, viz.:

First—Chap. 496, Laws of 1885, "An act to define, lay out and establish the boundaries and lines of Riverside Park and 12th avenue, between 79th and 129th streets, and to open 12th avenue and acquire title to the additional lands required for Riverside Park, as established by said act," provides that all maps and profiles required in said proceedings shall be furnished by this Department, upon the request of the Counsel to the Corporation or the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment appointed in such proceedings.

Second—Chap. 365, Laws of 1886, provides for altering and amending the map filed February 21, 1879, by striking therefrom that part of Morris avenue which lies between 162d street and Overlook avenue; and that part of 165th street between Winfield place and Sheridan avenue; and to alter and revise the plan of the streets and avenues in the 23d Ward between Railroad avenue, west, Webster avenue and

Sheridan avenue, and 162d and 167th streets and Overlook avenue, and to file copies of said revised plan according to law.

Third—Chap. 389, Laws of 1886, authorizes the Commissioners of this Department to close that portion of Bergen or "Retreat" avenue lying between 147th and 148th streets, in the 23d Ward, and to take from file so much of the map of said ward as to conform to the provisions of this act.

Fourth—Chap. 407, Laws of 1886, authorizes this Department to alter, change, widen, straighten, extend, enlarge, diminish or discontinue any street, road, avenue, park or public place which lies within that portion of the 23d and 24th Wards bounded by the Harlem river on the west; by Marcher, Claremont and Jerome avenues on the east; by a line drawn parallel to the northerly line of Depot place and 2,560 feet therefrom, and extending from Featherbed lane to the said river on the north, and by Union street and its prolongation to Jerome avenue and Wolf street on the south, on the application, in writing, of the owner or owners of a majority of the land fronting on the part of any street, avenue, park or public place within said area which he or they desire to have altered, and to file copies, according to law, of the map showing the alterations made, and showing also all the streets, roads, avenues, squares, public places and parks within the area above described, in pursuance of this act.

Fifth—Chap. 662, Laws of 1886, an act to discontinue that portion of Legget avenue lying between Trinity and Prospect avenues, in the 23d Ward, authorizes this Department to alter and amend the courses, windings, directions, widths, grades and designations of that portion of the said Legget avenue lying between Prospect avenue and Dawson street, and of the several avenues, streets, roads and public places at their intersections with that portion of the said "Legget avenue" which is discontinued by this act, and to make and to file, according to law, an amended map showing such alterations.

Sixth—Chap. 664, Laws of 1886, authorizes this Department to take from file certain maps showing streets and avenues in the 23d Ward, to change and establish streets and avenues, and the lines and grades thereof, and prepare and file a new map or maps showing such change in the streets and avenues, and in the lines and grades of streets and avenues, between St. Ann's and Trinity avenues and 138th and St. Mary's streets, as the Commissioners of this Department, or a majority of them, may deem proper.

Seventh—Chap. 670, Laws of 1886, authorizes this Department to take from file certain maps showing streets and avenues in the 23d Ward, and to prepare and file a new map of such portion thereof as may be necessary, in order to show on said new map the discontinuance of that portion of College avenue lying between the west side of North 3d avenue and the south side of 165th street.

Eighth—Chap. 675, Laws of 1886, empowers this Department to alter and amend the lines of the Bronx river road at its intersection with Eastchester street, and authorizes it to take from file a certain map, and to prepare and file a new map, showing thereon the said Bronx river road reduced in width as provided by this act.

Ninth—Chap. 681, Laws of 1886, empowers this Department, within four months after the passage of this act (June 15), to take from file all and any maps or plans and profiles hitherto prepared and filed by said Department, locating and laying out streets, avenues, roads, public squares and places and improvements in the 23d Ward, between Westchester avenue and 165th street, Melrose avenue and St. Ann's and 3d avenues, and to alter and amend said map or maps or plans and profiles by laying out, altering, amending and changing the grade of any of said streets, avenues, roads, public squares, and places embraced within said bounds, in such manner and to such extent as may best subserve and promote the public interests.

Whenever the said alterations and amendments of said map or maps and plans within said bounds shall be finally determined as aforesaid, this Department shall immediately cause said amended map or maps or plans and profiles showing such alterations and amendments to be made, certified and filed according to law. All acts and parts of acts giving power to the Department of Public Parks to survey, monument, locate, grade and lay out, and to acquire title to lands for streets, avenues, parks, public squares and places and improvements within said bounds, and all appropriations at their disposal for such purposes are hereby made applicable to the streets, avenues, roads, public squares and places, and all improvements located and laid out within the bounds aforesaid pursuant to this act.

In each of the foregoing cases 5 copies of the map have to be made—1 for adoption, 3 for filing, and 1 as a retained copy for the use of this office.

This Department has also to prepare the maps that are required by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement in laying out new streets, avenues, etc., and in extending, altering, etc., the streets, roads, avenues, parks, etc., heretofore laid out by this Department, in the north end of the 12th Ward and in the 23d and 24th Wards.

In such cases 7 copies of the maps have to be made—1 copy for adoption, 5 for filing and 1 retained copy.

2d. Making maps, plans, and profiles, showing grades to be established.

The establishing of the grades of the streets, avenues, roads, etc., heretofore laid out, is a very important matter, and much attention will have to be given to it in order to satisfy the numerous and urgent demands of property-owners who wish to have grades established in proximity to property which they desire to build upon or otherwise have improved.

The plans and profiles called "Grade and Monument Maps," showing the dimensions and angles, as well as the grades of the streets, have to be filed before the "Rule Maps" can properly be prepared for the use of the Corporation Counsel in taking proceedings for opening of the streets, avenues, etc.

7 copies have to be made—1 for adoption, 5 for filing, and 1 to be retained for the use of this office.

3d. Devising and preparing plans for sewerage districts in the 23d and 24th Wards.

Plans for several new sewerage districts have been asked for, some of which are now under way, notably for West Morrisania, High Bridge, Cromwell's Creek, part of Mill Brook, West Farms, Fordham and Bound Brook, the completion of which is an urgent necessity, as no sewers can be legally built until a plan of sewerage has first been devised, prepared and filed.

7 copies of each plan have to be made—1 for adoption, 5 for filing and 1 to be retained for office use.

The appropriation needed for Laying-out, under the foregoing three heads, is:

Monumenting.

The object of this work is to define, on the ground, by stones or bolts, the lines of the streets and their intersections as laid down on the maps.

The following is a synopsis of the method pursued in carrying on this work:

The first step is to refer the positions of the monuments to previously fixed points, called "traverse stations." A general map of the locality to be monumented is prepared in this office to serve as "instructions" to the surveyor in establishing the monument points on the ground. This map shows the main topographical features as obtained from the original topographical surveys, a plan of the street system as laid down on the filed maps, and designating approximate and desirable positions for traverse stations.

A preliminary survey is then made for the purpose of establishing the traverse stations on the ground in accordance with the instructions.

The "stations" are numbered, and connected by "traverse lines," which are measured to the 1,000th of a foot, and angles to the 10th of a second. Any topographical features, such as fences, buildings, walls, etc., which are likely to affect the final location of street lines, are located from the traverse lines for office use. Upon the completion of the preliminary surveys, the field notes are sent to this office, where the traverses are examined, and closed by the usual method of latitudes and departures, and the exact relative positions, or co-ordinates, of the stations and the balanced bearings of the traverse lines are calculated.

The stations and field notes are then accurately plotted on "working sheets," which are the foundation maps for all future work.

The street system is established by jointly considering the filed maps, the topography of the surface and existing landmarks, due attention being paid to the gradients and to the avoidance of any unnecessary encroachment on private property. The street lines and bearings having been determined, the co-ordinates of the monument points are then calculated for all tangent points and street intersections. The block dimensions are next calculated from the established co-ordinates of the monument points, and the results of all the cal-

culations are plotted to a scale of 80 feet to an inch, on the working sheets, together with street lines, names, widths, block angles and dimensions, block numbers, and the positions or locations of the several monuments with their proper designations.

The relative positions of stations and monument points are then calculated, and from the results diagrams, or "monument instructions," are prepared for the surveyor, who proceeds to set the monument points, according to the instructions, by means of stakes, to mark the exact spot to be occupied by the future monument, stone or bolt. A tracing or diagram is prepared, showing the positions of the monument points as marked by the stakes, for the use of the monumenting party which sets the stones or bolts in place of the stakes. The positions of the monument stones after they are set in the ground require to be "tested" by a direct survey, in order to be assured of their accuracy. A complete record is kept of all monumenting work and monument tests.

The work of monumenting is of primary importance, and should be completed as soon as possible. To carry it on properly the following force will be required, viz.:

Two Field Parties, of four members each, viz.: 1 Assistant Engineer in charge, 1 Assistant and 2 Axemen.

One Monumenting Party, to set the monument stones, to consist of two (2) Laborers under the charge of an Assistant, or Skilled Laborer; and of a corresponding office force, to consist of 1 Assistant Engineer, 1 Assistant Engineer and Computer, 1 Computer and 1 Draughtsman; for which the following appropriation will be needed, viz.:

Tax Maps.

The work of making and completing the Tax Maps of the 23d and 24th Wards for the use of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, as required by section 679, chapter 410, of the Laws of 1882, consists in making location surveys, from the monuments which have been set to define the new streets, of all property and lot lines, existing streets, roads, avenues, etc., and of all landmarks showing old farm lines and original subdivisions of land, where this information is not given on the maps in possession of this Department; making searches in the Register's office at White Plains, of conveyances recorded prior to 1874, and in the real estate records which have been tabulated and kept in this office since 1874, in order to obtain the subdivisions of property according to recorded deeds.

In connection with the searches, copies are made of all maps filed in the Register's office both at White Plains and in the City of New York, according to which property has been Examinations and comparisons are made of searches and surveys and property maps. The necessary calculations are then made to establish the relation existing between streets in use or laid out on property maps, and the streets, avenues, roads, etc., laid out and monumented by this Department. The necessary calculations are also made to determine the position and dimensions of property and lot lines and the area of each separate plot, as in possession, and also as "included within the lines of streets, roads, public squares and places shown and laid out upon any map or maps filed by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks," in accordance with the provisions of section 672 of the Laws of 1882, chap. 410, as amended by chap. 530 of the Laws of 1885.

The results of the comparisons and calculations are recorded on working pages, which are prepared as the work progresses.

After the working pages are completed, final copies of them are made showing the old and new street names, streets in use, and also proposed streets, lot and block numbers, lot and block dimensions and areas.

The Tax Maps or pages are forwarded to the Department of Taxes and Assessments, bound in volumes, each volume consisting of a title-page, or page showing the position of the volume in the Ward and the filed property map, with the dates of filing embraced by the particular volume; of an index-page, explanatory of the map pages; and of an average of 21 map pages.

The Tax Maps, when completed, will comprise some 24 volumes—9 for the 23d, and about 15 for the 24th Ward. Of these, 12 volumes have been made and transmitted to the Tax Department: 9 for the 23d Ward, which completes the series for that ward, and 3 for the 24th Ward.

Volumes 2 and 6, for the 24th Ward, are now in progress of completion. The completed volumes embrace the more thickly settled and the most subdivided portions of the two wards. The remaining volumes of the 24th Ward will comprise mainly farm lands and large estates, and will therefore be completed more rapidly than those already delivered.

The Tax Maps of the 23d and 24th Wards are required, in accordance with the directions received from the Tax Department, to show much more information than is to be found on the tax maps formerly made for the older wards. In addition to the lineal dimensions, there have now to be given the exact shape and area of each plot or parcel of land, as in possession, and also as included within the lines of the streets, avenues, roads, etc., shown and laid out on the filed maps, as required by chapter 530, Laws of 1885.

Besides the searches for Tax Maps, hereinbefore referred to, searches and examinations of the records, minutes, papers, etc., of the former towns of Morrisania and West Farms, are constantly required to be made relative to the *title* for the

use of the public to streets, roads, avenues, etc., laid out in those towns prior to annexation.

It is very important that the remaining volumes of the Tax Maps of the 24th Ward be completed as speedily as possible. The force required to carry the work on properly is as follows:

1 Field Party, to consist of 1 Assistant Engineer in charge; 1 Assistant and 2 Axemen; 1 Searcher; and of an office force of 2 Assistant Engineers, 3 Computers and 2 Draughtsmen, for which an appropriation will be needed, as follows:

- 1st. Making rule maps, in triplicate, for the use of the Counsel to the Corporation, and furnishing him with a technical description of the lands to be taken by the City, in proceedings to acquire title to streets, avenues, roads, parks, public places, etc., and to acquire the right of way for drains to be constructed as directed by the Board of Health.
- 2d. Making surveys and maps required by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment appointed in proceedings to acquire title to streets, avenues, roads, public parks and places, and the right of way for drains.

The first map required by such Commissioners is the "Damage Map," showing the lands, tenements, etc., to be taken in the proceeding; the second map is the "Benefit Map," and shows the lands, etc., to be assessed.

This Department has also to make the surveys and maps required in proceedings to acquire title for the use of the public to lands required for public parks and places in the 12th Ward, north of 155th street.

Barlow, property-holders in the 24th Ward of the City of New York, have petitioned that they themselves may do the work of opening the proposed extension to Bailey avenue, in said city, between Sedgwick avenue and the Kingsbridge road, in the said 24th Ward, under the supervision of a proper inspector and engineer, at their own expense, including the charges of the inspector and engineer;

Resolved, That the prayer of said petitioners be granted, and they themselves allowed to do such work, upon the following terms, conditions and stipulations:

I.—The work shall be under the immediate supervision of the Engineer of Construction in charge of Streets and Sewers in 23d and 24th Wards. It shall conform strictly to the grades and lines heretofore established for said portion of Bailey avenue, in accordance with law.

II.—The amount of "surveyor's fees," namely, ten cents per lineal foot for 3,000 feet, to be deposited with the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks.

III.—The Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks to appoint an inspector to supervise the execution of the work, to be paid \$3 per diem. The petitioners to deposit with the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, before work is actually begun, a sum sufficient to pay said inspector, at the above-named rate, for twice the time agreed upon by their contractor for doing the work; and if this sum should prove insufficient, then, from time to time, upon five (5) days' notice, such additional sum as the said Commissioners may determine to be necessary to pay said inspector, to be deposited with said Commissioners.

- IV.—The regulating and grading shall extend over the full width of the avenue. Slopes in excavation and embankment to extend over adjacent private property.
- V.—Proper, easy and safe connections to be graded from the new work to the present roadway at Kingsbridge road and Sedgwick avenue.
- VI.—Any destruction of, or injury to, gas or water pipes or appurtenances thereof, or any loss or damage to the city arising from the work, to be paid for by said petitioners.
- VII.—No estimate to be paid to any contractor for said grading until the same has been approved of by the Engineer of the Department of Public Parks.
- VIII.—The Engineer of the Department of Public Parks not to be called upon to give an exact estimate of work until its final completion; nor to give approximate estimates oftener than once a month, and then only when the amount of work done since previous estimate would amount to at least \$2,000.
- IX.—The specifications included in the contract for doing the work to be approved by the Engineer of the Department of Public Parks.
- X.—This permit shall be void after the expiration of two (2) years from date.
- XI.—And that the said work shall be done in all respects according to law, and the said petitioners shall indemnify and save harmless the City of New York and the Department of Public Parks, and Commissioners thereof, of and from all loss and damage, liability and claims arising out of, or in any way connected with said work.

President Department of Public Parks:

DEAR SIR-In accordance with your request of the 18th inst., I desire to report to you that I have made a detailed examination of the Bridle Paths of Central Park and Riverside Drive, and have also given much consideration during the past year to the problem of improving these paths. course of the bridle paths winds through nearly all of the most attractive scenery of the park. In the original design, the arrangement of the plantations, lawns and carriage drives has been carefully adjusted in what seemed to be the best way to secure satisfactory effects in all the different features of the park. I believe, therefore, that at this stage of the history of the park, the advisability of radically changing the course and width of the bridle paths may still be strongly questioned. Artistic effects of the outlines of lawns and plantations would be in that case materially changed and encroached upon, and the unity of the design in all probability greatly endangered. The plantations along the edges of the bridle paths should be modified to the extent of removing trees that overcrowd these paths or each other, or that have already reached a period of decay that makes their removal necessary; spruces and pines on the west side of Central Park are in many cases conspicuous examples of this kind. Occasionally, also, shrubs will be seen that have grown out so far into the path that pruning them no longer suffices, and their entire removal becomes necessary. The proper treatment of the plantations, of course, involves occasional replanting of suitable trees and shrubs. The plantations on the sharp curves are necessary for the proper park effects. They should, however, be pruned and rearranged, in such a way as to obscure the view of the rider as little as possible. To do this, shrubs of medium growth should be used in replanting, and trees that grow pyramidal, rather than spreading or drooping, should be employed. In the matter of plantations, I should advise the employment of deciduous trees in large numbers, rather than evergreens. Evergreens, unfortunately, as a rule, do not thrive well in the shallow, dry soil of Central Park, and moreover, obscure the view more completely than deciduous trees.

The principal attention, however, I consider should be given to the condition of the soil of the bridle paths. In the course of years of increasing wear and imperfect maintenance, many portions of these paths have been trodden down so much as to render them unpleasant to both horse and rider. This applies particularly to the paths of the lower portion of the park, which have been more used. I would recommend that the entire surface of these paths be repaired by loosening up an inch or two of the soil by the employment of picks and hammers. After this, all large pebbles should be raked off, and then added a proper mixture of sharp gravel and loam, free from all pebbles, and one or two inches thick.

I would also suggest that two horse drinking-fountains be placed at different points on the bridle paths of Central Park. One in the neighborhood of 79th street and Eighth avenue, and another at the northeast corner of the large reservoir near the juncture of the two bridle-paths, not far from 96th street and 5th avenue.

In the case of the soil of the bridle-paths of Riverside drive, I would also suggest that the same treatment be applied,

with the exception that I would use, on account of its present condition, a larger mixture of loam.

DEAR SIR—I desire to report to you that the pressing need for a comprehensive renewal of the plantations of Central Park has become especially evident this season. Large portions of these plantations were made five and twenty years ago: and the stress of the changes of winter and summer. with other causes that shorten the life of trees and shrubs has resulted in a loss of vigor and shapeliness, and in some cases of life. This is undoubtedly the natural process of growth, maturity, and decay. Trees cannot be expected to live forever; but in addition to this, I have no hesitation in saving that a process that is not natural has been going on all these years, produced by a persistently defective management of the original system of planting. There was evidently a definite intention on the part of the designers of the park to create large masses and comparatively immediate effects. The trees and shrubs were therefore set out at short distances apart, the plan intended to be pursued evidently being to remove, from time to time, every plant that showed signs of becoming crowded. The work of thinning out these plants has only been attended to intermittently and to an entirely inadequate extent. All over the park trees and shrubs may be seen in greater or less degrees of health, crowded together until their shapeliness and proper development have been greatly injured, or actually destroyed. Of course, in the aggregate, a large amount of thinning out of the Central Park groves and shrubberies has actually been accomplished, but

in my estimation the greater portion of the work still remains The difficulty of accomplishing these undertakings is great and, in some cases in actual practice, it will be better to arrange new plantations entirely. It is always necessary in such work to carefully study the original intention of the designers so as to find out the particular mass effect of skyline, middle distance, and foreground that were aimed at, and also to comprehend the shadings of color that were intended to be produced by those who designed the original plantations. If the endeavor to do this is successful it means that the missing links of color and form, whatever they may prove to be, have been supplied in the shape of fresh trees and shrubs. All this, moreover, must be accomplished without injuring too radically the existing general effects of the park which the public does not expect to lose to any great extent. Another difficulty that must be met is the selection of trees and shrubs for the new plantations. The experience of twenty-five years has thoroughly demonstrated that certain trees and shrubs, reputed hardy, have proved themselves unsuited to the soil and exposure of Central Park. The Norway spruce and most other spruces have notably The pines, Scotch and Austrian, have done badly. A number of choice Japanese evergreens, known as the retinosporas, have not generally succeeded. Among deciduous trees and shrubs, I find that the European ash and European poplar and alder invariably become diseased and unhealthy after a few years; also that the European oaks and elms have not done as well, on the average, as their American relatives of the same genus. It is evident, therefore, in the light of this experience, that a careful revision of the original list of trees and shrubs must be made before undertaking extensive new There are many valuable trees, such as the plantations. Colorado spruce and the Alcock spruce, and some shrubs, such as the rhodora canadensis, that have come into general use since most of the plantations of Central Park were made, and in the preparation of the list the aim should be to employ freely the better sorts of this class.

The greatest of the difficulties above mentioned appears to me to be the thinning out and preparing spots for new plantations so as not to disfigure, to any serious extent, the general effect of the park. A system will, of course, have to be established of taking out at any one time only comparatively small portions of groups in the different parts of the park. The soil should be prepared with great care by the addition of new mould and fertilizers, and in every case only the largest and most healthy specimens should be set out that the nature of the plant used will allow. The removal of the disfigured and dead, or partially dead trees, and the preparation of the soil constitute by far the largest part of the labor and expense of renewing the plantations. A successful result must also depend on the establishment of a proper collection of trees and shrubs after vigilant search in American and foreign nurseries. Active cultivation for a year in the park nursery must follow, for in this way only can the trees and shrubs be ready for removal at the proper season with the least danger of loss in transplanting. The carrying on of a well-equipped nursery where the plants can be temporarily set out that have been purchased is, thus it will be seen, of vital importance. It is proper for me to remark at this point, that the system that I have indicated has been measurably the practice of the Department for some time. The difficulty is that it has not been carried on to anything like the extent that the imminent necessities of the situation require. I should suggest that during the next year one hundred gardeners be employed, in addition to the twentyfive or thirty now in the park, with the necessary assistant laborers, and the proper quantity of mould and manure be secured so that a decided step may be taken next year towards accomplishing a really comprehensive renewal of the park plantations.

The outlay required for this work it is impossible for any one to estimate in advance with precision, because the exact condition of thousands of trees and shrubs, and the cost of handling each of them, can only be determined when the work is systematically undertaken.

The park is a definite work of art, in which each part of the original design has been considered in its relation to the other parts. The plantations, it is manifest, form the most important and truly distinctive feature of what is generally understood as the park. The interesting gradations of color and form must evidently be retained in order to properly preserve what may be termed the essential artistic character of the design. The death or decay of trees and shrubs, and the deforming of shapely specimens by crowding or neglect, certainly tends to destroy all these carefully defined combinations of color and contour. It is clear, therefore, that a constant renewal of the plantations of the park'is, and must always be, a most important feature of the general scheme of maintenance.

DEAR SIR—In accordance with your instructions of the 18th inst., I desire to report to you my conclusions in regard to the treatment necessary to be adopted for the proper maintenance of the lawns of Central Park, and other parks during the coming year.

In Central Park, and in portions of the other parks of the Department, the meadow stretches consist mostly of rocks covered more or less thickly with soil. Extensive areas of rock surface have been filled in to various depths, some altogether too shallow and others deep enough for the production of vigorous greensward. Trees and shrubs have been planted

on this made ground at such points as the paths, roads and rocks would permit, with a due consideration for making the open lawns as large as the peculiar contours of the park would allow.

In this manner fifty acres, out of the eight hundred and sixty, of the entire park have been secured for open greensward; and even in these contracted lawn spaces or meadows the rock comes in different places very near the surface in many parts of the fifty acres. The natural consequence of this is that the lawns show a tendency to suffer quickly from drought, wherever the shallow areas over rocks exist. The wear and tear of visitors who are and ought to be allowed to occupy the lawns with great freedom also tends to injure these shallow spots more than the rest of the lawns. The entire surface of the grass spaces has also much to suffer, from the occupation of visitors who sometimes will wantonly destroy the greensward in spite of the watchfulness of the police.

The soil of Manhattan Island is, as a rule, light and deficient in the requisite amount of clay to make entirely satisfactory lawns. In consequence it may be said that the greensward covering of the lawns of Central Park and the other City parks are constitutionally less able to resist the effects of drought and the wear and tear mentioned than lawns in other parts of the country.

To meet these various difficulties in the future, I should recommend the addition of a further supply of mould, rich in clay, and a still more liberal use of well-composted fertilizers. Wherever the shallow spots show themselves by turning brown, the existing sod, if of sufficient consistency, should be carefully removed in small sections, and mould added to the depth, in some cases, of several inches, and in others of a foot or more.

It is not proposed that the whole of this revision should be undertaken in any one year, but that it should be the recognized policy of the Department to secure an additional supply of the material needed whenever it is offered at a sufficiently low cost; and with this object in view 3,000 yards of mould have been stored in various parts of the Park during the past year with reference to the next season's operations.

After arranging the contours of the newly filled in territory so as to adjust all the lines properly and agreeably to those of the surrounding lawns, the uninjured sods will be replaced and thoroughly rammed, thus enabling the whole greensward thus treated to renew itself in a few weeks.

The healthy new growth of this sod, however, can only be obtained by moist weather or by the application of liberal and frequent waterings. In the numerous spots where the greensward is worn along the edges of drives and paths and under trees, and at different points on the lawns where the games are played, the ground should be dug up, fresh mould applied to raise the grade to its proper level, and fresh sod set out.

The entire lawns should have, from time to time, a light coating of about half an inch of mould and a liberal application of grass seed, equal parts of Kentucky blue grass and red top. This practice should be carried on every spring, and every weed in the newly planted spots should be destroyed by actually digging or pulling it out.

The application of mould must be followed by a liberal supply of manure in either late fall, winter or early spring. Large compost heaps of alternate layers of mould and stable manure should be stored away in retired corners of the park. This practice of mixing mould and manure prevents the production of disagreeable odors, and preserves in the mass the valuable volatile fertilizing matters, such as ammonia, etc.

It should be the regular practice, as a part of necessary maintenance, to cover yearly every particle of the grass surface of a lawn situated in this part of the United States, with a liberal coating of fertilizer thus prepared. I am confident that if this were done with regularity and persistence, the lawns would soon be able to not only resist drought successfully, but also to give visitors full freedom to occupy their grass surface during nearly every day in the year. I would recommend in connection with the sodding and seeding of fresh spots, that a wire fence be constructed to supplement for the time being the efforts of the police, as visitors must be kept from treading too soon on the tender herbage.

I would say in conclusion that I consider the proper maintenance of the lawns of the parks as of primary importance. In a certain sense the lawns are the parks, the plantations serving as their necessary framework, but not having an independent value.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS, NEW YORK, Jan'y 15, 1887.

Hon. A. S. Hewitt,

Mayor of the City of New York.

DEAR SIR:

On Thursday, December 30th last, a paper was presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by one of its own members, making certain and general reflections on the administration of the Department of Public Parks, of so serious a nature that they should be noticed.

The author of this paper was President Coleman, of the Tax Commission. The delay in calling your official attention to the matter has been caused by our inability to obtain the paper alluded to, having succeeded in getting the same from Commissioner Coleman not until Wednesday, January 5th last.

The charges contained in this paper are sweeping, inasmuch as they cover every branch of service under our care, in many instances general in their nature, and expressed by bare assertion of opinion as fact, in other and fewer cases, specific in form, and supported in a greater or less degree by figures and comparisons, which, for the most part, are either unfair or untrue.

In self defense, and for the good name of the Department we, for the time, represent, in the interest of good government, which is *hindered* and *handicapped* in no small degree by bad servants and unprincipled accusers alike, we beg you to review with us the charges brought, and our answer to the same, as briefly as the occasion will permit.

Considering Commissioner Coleman's paper in the order observed therein, attention is first called to the Park Police.

POLICE.

Under this head it is asserted that the necessities for the Police service, "are not much greater to-day than they were in 1879," and that the sum appropriated then for this use "should be almost sufficient now."

It is impossible that such a statement could emanate from a thoughtful or well informed man, and that *every* man *could* be well informed on this point, with little trouble to himself, is apparent by a comparative statement of the service for the years named:

The above figures are taken from the Bureau of Police and indicate clearly enough both *greater* necessities and *more efficient* and *active service* during the last year, as compared with 1879, in the ratio of *two* to *one*.

It is further asserted, that, during the past year, one Park Policeman has been convicted of attempted murder, and another of larceny. All that can be said in reply to this charge is, that it is false.

It is again charged that "politics has crept into this branch of the service to an alarming extent, so much so, that the Park Policemen feel themselves to be above law, and careless of the disciplinary measures of their superiors."

A comparison of the course of discipline made from the records of the Police trials, for the years 1879 and 1886, is here suggestive and convincing.

No political or other influence of any kind has, during the past year availed, or can at the present time protect an officer of this force from punishment, measured by his wrong-doing, if found guilty of a punishable offense.

Referring again to Commissioner Coleman's assertion that the necessities of the Department for police service "are not much greater to-day than in 1879," we call your attention to the fact that Riverside Park in that year had no police at all, save one mounted officer during the day, and now has nineteen men; that in 1879 the city parks were policed by only one man in each during the day alone and now are covered for the most part day and night requiring a service of 35 men; that, in 1879, excepting on the bridle paths, there were no mounted men on duty in Central Park, and to-day there are seven, and should be many more; that the need of police protection in the Central Park to-day is far greater than in 1879, because of the largely increased use of both the bridle paths and drives-notably the East Drive,-and we are forced to the conclusion that, with 100 men on the force in 1879, and 157 to day, and with 54 men now doing duty outside the jurisdiction of the Park Police in 1879, we have for the territory covered at that time, no increase whatever in the Park Police of to-day as compared to that year.

It is our firm conviction, fortified by a close observation and study of results already obtained, that a reasonable increase of this force over its present numbers, would operate for the welfare of the public in the prevention of serious accident and loss of life imperilled by the same.

So far as Commissioner Coleman's review of the situation with regard to the Police is concerned, in no particular can his position be maintained.

MUSEUMS.

Concerning the Museums, we cordially agree with all that Commissioner Coleman says (excepting only a single unbecoming allusion to politics again), because he says nothing unworthy of himself or his subject.

Music.

The number of open-air concerts in the Central and City Parks during the past year has been greater than ever before, and careful observation has led us to believe that all the money expended in this direction has been productive of the most beneficent results, in the pleasure of refining and cultivating kind that it has brought within the reach of the classes who, nowhere else, share such enjoyment with the more fortunate.

Commissioner Coleman, by way of comparison, deserts the year 1879 in this instance, and fixes upon 1884 as a proper standard of measure for the appropriation of today.

It is an arbitrary assumption on his part, and the amount fixed upon by him in this way might, with equal propriety, be any lesser or greater sum, as he himself might happen to think.

It is our business to inform ourselves, by careful watchfulness and consideration of the results to be obtained, and the cost of obtaining them, in the expenditure of money for this, as well as all other legitimate purposes in our care, and with this light to guide us, we believe that no cutting of the appropriation asked for music would be economy, in the best sense of the word—a conviction apparently largely shared by the Board of Estimate itself, since the sum finally voted us for this use is \$16,000 instead of the \$10,000 which Commissioner Coleman declares is enough.

Added to these considerations, it should not be forgotten that we have urged upon the Board of Estimate the necessity for early and considerable repairs and alterations to the music stands occupied by the bands, involving an expenditure of several thousand dollars, the occasion for which has been plainly stated to the Board of Estimate, but is altogether ignored by Commissioner Coleman in this connection.

Furthermore, what does Commissioner Coleman mean when he assumes to dispose of the whole matter of music in the parks, by declaring that, the season of 1884 was, from all points of view, quite as successful with an expenditure of \$10,000, as that of last year with an appropriation of twice the amount? In 1884, the concerts were confined almost exclusively to the Central and Battery Parks, and numbered all told 47. In 1886 the privilege was extended to include nearly all the City Parks, embracing impartially the districts frequented by the poorer and middle classes, and the number of concerts was increased to 94. It follows that the benefits, thus distributed, were equal to the excess of appropriation in 1886, as compared with 1884, not only in the actual number of concerts given, but, what is far more to be desired, in the indiscriminating direction that treated all classes and districts alike.

Can it be Commissioner Coleman's deliberate intention to object to this? Is it possible that he can dispense the public money by his vote for concerts in the Central and Battery Parks, and withhold it for concerts in such places as Tompkins, Paradise, East River and Washington Square Parks? We commend Commissioner Coleman to a most thoughtful consideration of the ground on which he stands, when he declares that concerts are for the Central and Battery Parks alone, and not for the less pretentious parks and the classes that surround them, and we reply to his concluding remark, with respect to this, that, from no point of view save his own, was the season of Park Concerts as successful in 1884 as in 1886.

HARLEM RIVER BRIDGES.

Referring to the appropriation for Harlem River Bridges, Commissioner Coleman continues in these words: "This money is used for the purpose of maintaining and repairing bridges, and not for any constructive purposes. In 1884 and 1885 \$25,000 proved ample, and is much above the annual average expenditure for the period between 1879 and 1886, inclusive." Let Commissioner Coleman examine the records of the Board of Estimate, and he will discover that in 1883 that Board found it proper to transfer, from other appropriations, to the appropriation for Harlem River Bridges, the sum of \$14,314.48, which was expended—in 1885 the sum of \$5,000—and again in 1886, so recently that it should be fresh in his memory, the sum of \$3,200 in addition to the amount he says was appropriated and expended under this head. Do Commissioner Coleman's figures add weight to his assertions?

All repairs and improvements, the care of and supplies for the maintenance of these bridges, are charged to this account, and, included in this, is the pay of the force employed to work the draws and police the bridges throughout the day and night. The traffic of the river and the demands of commerce have increased so rapidly, in this vicinity, that the draws must be opened at frequent intervals during the entire day and often in the night, imposing upon us the employment of a continual force, divided into three gangs working eight hours each. In no branch of our service is the responsibility greater or more keenly realized by the Commissioners than in the care and maintenance of these bridges. Accidents, resulting from defective flooring or through incompetent engineers in swinging backward and forward the immense draws, or by reason of an insufficient force to keep back the people during the opening and closing of the draws, might entail large damages on the city, if neglect could be shown. Construction and reconstruction. Commissioner Coleman to the contrary notwithstanding, are continually going on, to insure greater safety. During the years 1885 and 1886, 240 lineal feet of trestle approaches on the easterly end, 120 feet on the westerly end, and 372 lineal feet of wood superstructure, were constructed on the Central or McCombs Dam Bridge alone. While this work was in progress the bridge was closed for 14 days to all traffic excepting foot passengers. The work

itself, while extensive, was most necessary, and was carried on intelligently and with all possible expedition and economy. Not to continue a discussion of this matter here, we ask your attention to a communication presented to the Board of Estimate by Commissioner Crimmins and read before that body on December 27, 1886, a copy of which is submitted.

RIVERSIDE PARK.

Concerning Riverside Park, Commissioner Coleman limits the amount to be expended for its maintenance during the coming year to the sum of \$15,000, and practically forbids us to do anything whatever toward its improvement or development. The bare cost of maintaining and keeping in repair the miles of walks and drives and acres of lawns within this park was \$18,000 during the year just past, and this item certainly cannot, with propriety, be reduced for the year to come. Widely differing from this class of work, a constructive feature of no inconsiderable importance confronts us. The condition of the high, steep bank along the railroad, on the westerly side of the park, in the neighborhood of One Hundred and Twenty-third street, necessitates the erection of a heavy retaining wall for a distance of several thousand feet, at least one thousand feet of which should be laid during the coming year. This work is *imperative*, and cannot probably be done for less than \$15,000. Added to these are other hardly less important considerations which command our notice and merit our attention. Considerable areas of partially finished Park lawns and meadows exist at Seventy-ninth street, and from Ninety-first street nearly to the northerly end of this Park and around Claremont Hotel, all of which should be laid out in walks and planted with shrubs and trees and seeded, in accordance with new plans prepared, and for this work would be needed, according to the estimate of the Superintendent of Parks, the sum of \$17,000. Commissioner Coleman is, so far, quite in accord with us when he says "the proper course for the Board of Park Commissioners to pursue before asking for an appropriation is to tell what they are going to do with it," and to the *smallest detail possible*, and if this was all the Board of Estimate required of us, the appropriation for Riverside Park for the year 1877 would stand at \$50,000, instead of \$25,000, the *ill-advised and insufficient* amount allowed.

BRONX RIVER BRIDGES.

With respect to the item of Bronx River Bridges, Commissioner Coleman is *irrelevant*.

He certainly condemns the appropriation, but not the Commissioners of Parks. He says: "This appropriation should be in the general appropriation for the maintenance of the upper wards. There is no necessity whatever for the expenditure of any such amount, under a separate appropriation, for these bridges."

Is it possible that Commissioner Coleman is ignorant of the law under which he acts? Has he never known, or has it escaped his memory that section 194 of the Consolidation Act, from which he derives his power and direction in the matter of appropriations, specifically declares that "there shall be an annual appropriapay the to proportion \mathbf{of} expense able to the city for the building, maintenance and repairs of public bridges over the Bronx River, between the City and County of New York and the County of Westchester, which are now built, or may hereafter be built." In this instance, Commissioner Coleman's objective point is the Legislature of his State, and not the Department of Public Parks.

SEWERS AND DRAINS.

The next item that comes before us is Sewers and Drains. Without passing any judgment on the Board of Estimate, or speculating as to their reason for making no appropriation in 1879 and 1880, for the use of Sewers and Drains, we find Commissioner Coleman strangely

in error concerning this matter. To quote his words again, "This fund is devoted to the purpose of paying for the drawing of maps, plans, &c., for sewers and drains in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards." The truth is that not one dollar of this appropriation is devoted to any such purpose.

At the close of 1886, there were under the charge of the Department 20,450 feet of old sewers; 88,448 feet of new sewers; 2,250 feet of old stone drains; 13,300 feet of blind drains; 2,100 feet of open drains; 8,788 feet of uncovered drains; 544 receiving basins, and 880 man-holes.

The number of feet of new sewers and the number of receiving basins are increasing annually and require constant repairing and cleaning. In a large portion of this district the streets are not paved, and every heavy rain storm causes the roads and lands adjoining to wash into the sewers and drains, requiring a great outlay to keep the flow open. It is also a *public necessity* to keep the open drains in such a condition as not to menace the health of the community.

Frequent demands are made by the Board of Health for the cleaning of these sewers and drains, and this Department must in all cases comply with such demands to the limit of the appropriation afforded it. The Department of Public Works has a separate appropriation for this kind of work, south of the Harlem River. Can Commissioner Coleman think it less important for those who live north of the river?

That such a work "should cost successively less each year instead of more," as Commissioner Coleman asserts, is absurd.

INCUMBRANCES.

"The item of Incumbrances," Commissioner Coleman declares, "is an account which should not exist, in view of the fact that it should all fall under the head of General Maintenance." But why? Is this Commissioner Coleman's opinion, and does that settle it? Or is there any other and better reason for it? What is the appropriation

for? It is for removing incumbrances, and, in no sense of the word, for maintenance.

The amount asked for and allowed for 1887 is \$1,500. and the nature of these incumbrances is as follows: When a street or road is acquired by the city through due process of law, buildings, fences and other constructions existing thereon are offered for sale at auction Such as are purchased are removed. while the remainder are left to form barriers and obstructions which must ultimately be cleared away. From this account the salary of an inspector receiving \$2.50 per day is also paid, whose duty it is to learn if the conditions of the permits for placing building materials on the streets are complied with. The exercise of such permission is often abused.

Building material placed on the street is sometimes abandoned by the owners, and must be removed by the Department.

Obstructions of various kinds and in considerable quantities are frequently left on the sidewalks and streets, and a proper use of the \$1,500 appropriated would no doubt save to the city many times the amount by the avoidance of troublesome and costly litigation.

SURVEYING AND LAYING OUT.

In his comments on surveying, laying out and monumenting, after a statistical presentation intended to show how the appropriations for this purpose have fluctuated during the past seven years, Commissioner Coleman accounts for it all by saying that "The trouble in this regard is identical with that concerning sewers and drains. New men are being continually employed, and plans which have heen accepted and approved are being continually rejected, although originally made at great cost to the city;" and, again, that "nothing could be worse for the Department than the continued change incident to the advent of each new Commissioner in the Board, and of the necessity of every political party to have some friend

or retainer employed in this particular department from time to time."

What has become of Commissioner Coleman's common sense? Are we seriously expected to believe that each new Commissioner of Parks is accompanied by a canddidate for place in the topographical force? What will Commissioner Coleman think when we tell him, as we do, who the present head of the Bureau is, and that he had a single predecessor only as far back as 1878? Col. Chalfin a graduate of West Point, a gentleman of high rank in his profession, coming to us after a most creditable examination before the Civil Service Commission, was appointed to the place he now holds in 1884, while Mr. Edgar B. Van Winkle, who last preceded him in that position, held his place for six consecutive years, and then resigned to attend to his private business. What will happen to Commissioner Coleman's insinuation as to political influence, when we tell him further, that the principal assistants in this Bureau have been employed in its service since 1871, while the average term of service of all is $5\frac{1}{2}$ years. within our own knowledge, nor so far as we can anywhere find evidence, has any change whatever been made of late years for political reasons. The appropriation now under discussion is expended in surveying, laying out, and monumenting the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and preparing tax maps.

Surveys must be made in connection with the monumenting and the work of preparing tax maps and maps showing streets and roads to be laid out. In this latter connection it may be explained that the Legislature, from time to time, make laws requiring the Department to define, lay out, and establish the boundaries of certain streets and roads, to alter maps on file, and to discontinue and straighten streets.

During the year 1886, no less than *nine* special laws of this character were enacted. In every one of these cases, five copies of the map have to be made—one for adoption, three for filing, and one to be retained for reference in the Department office. Maps, plans and profiles showing the

grades to be established must be prepared and plans for sewerage in the 23d and 24th Wards devised. Of each of these, seven copies must be made—one for adoption, five for filing, and one for the Department office.

The monumenting of the 23d and 24th Wards and that part of Manhattan Island north of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street is charged to this account.

Tax maps must also be prepared and furnished, out of this appropriation, to the Department of Taxes and Assessment, as required by section 679, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, and in the preparation of these maps, searchers are employed in the Register's Office at White Plains, where conveyances are recorded prior to 1874, and in the Register's Office in this city, where conveyances have been recorded since that time. Twelve volumes of these tax maps have been completed and are now in the office of the Tax Commissioners.

In past years this branch of the work of this Depart ment has been frequently criticized and is *constantly be*ing misrepresented. These maps are the record, for all time, of property lines and lots contained in the 12,000 acres of the city north of Harlem River, and much depends upon their accuracy.

The Commissioners of Parks do not underestimate the valuable experience and expert knowledge of this corps, and make no changes in it unless recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief, and this has happened just three times. In all probability there is no bureau, National, State or Municipal, where so few changes are made.

SURVEYS, MAPS AND PLANS.

Alluding to the matter of surveys, maps and plans, Commissioner Coleman condemns it altogether as an independent item, and comments, with some show of sarcasm, on the care displayed by this Board in fixing the sum of \$22,600 to a nicety, as the amount required for the proper prosecution of this work during the coming year. The only reason in the world for naming just these figures

and no others is, because the estimated cost of the different items making the whole amount needed for the prosecution of the work before us, carefully computed and made up by the Engineer, footed up just \$22,600. Continuing, we learn from Commissioner Coleman that "as a matter of fact, any one thoroughly familiar with the workings of this Board knows that there is no necessity for any appropriation whatever under this title." It is to this appropriation that the expense of making preliminary maps and plans for the construction of sewers and drains in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, the cost of which will be assessed against the property benefited by this construction, is charged. Under this appropriation examinations and surveys are made-soundings for rock; estimates, specifications and forms of contracts for new streets and improvements made—as well as soundings to determine the necessity for piling, in sewer work, while all instruments and tools required in the performance of this work, including office expenses and the transportation expenses of engineers, are charged to the appropriation.

It is of the utmost consequence that this branch of the work be done with care and accuracy, in order to avoid unbalanced bids for works of local improvements.

The appropriation is necessary for the reason that no charge can be made against public improvements that are paid for by assessment, until the work is put under contract. In addition to all this, we are occasionally required to have examinations, surveys and reports made in cases where accidents have occurred, and suits resulted against the city, also surveys and reports in the alterations of streets and change of grades.

Finally, to this appropriation is chargeable the cost of surveys, maps, plans and descriptions in the matter of acquiring title to land for street openings of which there are many, and new proceedings every year.

The statement of Commissioner Coleman that "the theory of the Board is that this account is to be distinguished from that of surveying and laying out, because it is done in-doors, whereas the work done under the latter title is out of doors," must be without much foundation, since it is *impossible* to make any such distinction.

MAINTENANCE OF PARKS.

In the consideration of this division of our work, the most important as involving the largest outlay of money, the most comprehensive in the extent and permanence of its results, and the most difficult because of the vital relations of each successive season to the system as a whole. Commissioner Coleman paints with a free hand, and discourses in a flippant style, which, to the least thoughtful, grows more intolerable with every word, until he concludes with statements so shamelessly untrue that it would. seem unnecessary for us to refer to or refute them. us, however, possess our patience while we endeavor to analyze the situation as he states it. Retreating again to the year 1879, in which he affirms that the Parks were allowed to "run to waste" at an expense of \$150,000 devoted to their care for that year, Commissioner Coleman decides that an increase of \$100,000 a year in 1881 and 1882 was quite ample to restore the Parks from this deplorable condition and bring them out of their state of decay (whatever that may mean), and into so good a condition that, by Commissioner Coleman's rule, it was found safe in 1883 to retrograde again, and \$225,000 was deemed enough.

He then proceeds to assert that in 1883 the Parks were well maintained, so that—mark the logic—so that, a return to the appropriation of 1881 and 1882 was found ample and has his sanction. Can Commissioner Coleman tell us why this increase of appropriation in 1884 was made, or why it was reduced in 1883? Can he account to himself, or explain to us, the process of reasoning by which so unstable and see-saw a policy can find his approval in apportioning the public money for departmental purposes? Can he tell us how it is, that, with his convictions now publicly expressed, with his asserted ability to measure the amount necessary for proper maintenance of the Parks, how it is, that when he knew \$250,000 was all that

could be wisely expended, he submitted to and, as one of the Board of Estimate, voted for an increase for 1886 of \$100,000 more? Can be tell us why he did this then and does not do this now? Or shall we tell Commissioner Coleman something more pertinent still. Shall we tell him, that there are twenty-three parks, squares and places cared for by this department, covering in the aggregate over 1,000 acres of land, not in compact or adjacent form, but scattered over the city and separate from each other by miles, laid out and adapted for differpurposes, all requiring attention, enlisting and demanding the highest available skill supplemented by all grades of service from professional to the most ordinary, requiring for maintenance an expenditure varying in its degree and extent, and impossible of determination except by a comprehensive and studied knowledge of the whole and all its parts. Will Commissioner Coleman tell us he is competent to give an intelligent opinion on all this? Shall we ask Commissioner Coleman what he means when he says the result for 1886 is not appreciably better than in 1883 and 1884? Shall we remind him that the use of the lawns for games and recreations has been largely extended and with corresponding expense for equipment and care—that the cutting out of dead and overcrowded trees has been a feature of the past year's work, in excess of anything in this direction for yearsthat this work especially is more necessary now than ever before—that the production of flowering and bedding plants and bulbs has been more than doubled in 1886 that, for the first time in the history of the Parks, extensive and elaborate arrangements of water-lily plantations have been introduced in the fountain basins of the City and Central Parks, and in a water-lily pond laid out and constructed at considerable expense, all these eliciting the admiration and approval of the people here and the most favorable comment of the Press the country through —that special attention and no little expense has been devoted to the planting out and arranging of portions of the Central Park, the improvement of which had been heretofore neglected—that the facilities for propagating plants in the greenhouses have been notably enlarged—that the amount of gravel spread on the roads has been largely in excess of former years—that a large quantity of wire fence has been put in place to protect the grass borders—that more than 100,000 square feet of sod has been purchased and set where needed-that miles of tar asphalt walks have been laid—in short, shall we tell Commissioner Coleman that the work of this Department is accumulative, progressive, incapable of estimate save by knowledge that cannot obtain, unless acquired by close study and attention to the work itself. Shall we tell him further, and above all this, that no one of us has yet learned enough, with all our study and experience, to fix independently of ourselves on the sum necessary for the maintenance of the Public Parks—that the Superintendent of Parks with his staff, his advisers and associates professionally skilled. coupling his accomplished works and known results thereon with comprehensive plans, considered in detail and as a whole, for the furtherance and most perfect development of the improvement of the parks—that he, as instructed by us, makes an estimate, not guessed at, but worked out on intelligent and competent grounds, and that it is on such a basis, modified if at all by our best judgment only as to the limit of our duty, that we base our application for appropriations to this Board. standard, will Commissioner Coleman insist that he can prescribe the lines within which this or any other great public work is to be advanced; or will he be honest enough to admit that, from the nature of the case, he at any rate cannot say what is needed for the maintenance of the

But there is a graver question for Commissioner Coleman to reflect upon than this, and we pass to its consideration. Proceeding in his attack, he leaves the discussion of maintenance money used, to consider the antecedents and fitness of the men employed, and here he has the hardihood to say that "the maintenance account is the account which ought to take care of the mechanical and

laboring class." To such a theory we will not assent. The maintenance account should take care of no classes what-Good mechanics and honest laborers should take of it. To auote Commissioner Coleman's care words again. "all of the political workers, instead of the honest laborer, who find an easy and comfortable position in the Park Department are maintained out of this appropriation which is quite properly named." Unless this statement is true it is abominable, and it is not true. That laborers and mechanics find employment in this Department, recommended by men in office in all branches of political life and outside of them, is undoubtedly a fact. There is no want of pressure on the Commissioners of Parks for such appointments. Assemblymen and Judges. Aldermen and Senators, Mayors and Commissioners, all seem to have an inexhaustible following, importunate and persistent candidates for work in the public pay, and when men are needed in this Department, it is not deemed necessary to exclude all such as are so recommended for employment. But if the Superintendent, and through him the Foremen of Divisions, respect the rule laid down for their guidance with respect to this, no man remains in the pay of this Department if he is found incapable or unwilling to earn the wages he is paid. It is, in no sense, wrong or improper to give employment to any able-bodied man, provided there is work for him to do. It is, in every sense, both improper and wrong and dishonest to place men on the public pay-roll, with a knowledge of their physical incapacity when appointed, and Commissioner Coleman's imputation that such is our custom is unworthy of utterance from the lips of any fair or honest man.

ZOOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

Of the Zoological Department, Commissioner Coleman makes very short work indeed. After unqualifiedly commending the Gardens as a great educational institution, and adding the somewhat startling statement that they afford genuine gratification and entertainment to our ENTIRE population, he permits the subject to drop with

the remark that "it is well managed and deserves the appropriation asked for the coming year," but *misstates* this as \$30,000 instead of \$60,000, which, as a matter of fact and record, was desired.

The public health and recreation are the chief ends for which the parks exist, and, of these, the last named has no more important factor than the zoological exhibi-Two years ago, the collection of animals here to be found was small in number and variety, many of its specimens of indifferent or poorer quality, and the exhibition altogether unworthy of, rather than a credit to, the city. It has been our endeavor to make the collection larger, more attractive and as complete as everything should be in the incomparably most beautiful park in the world. To this end much has been accomplished during the past year. The accessions by purchase include a pair of striped hyenas, a male and female lion, a tigress, a hippopotamus, among the larger animals, and many of smaller and less important but most desirable kind: so that this Department has come to attract largely increased attention both here and abroad. In evidence of its meeting a popular want in our own midst, it is not an uncommon occurrence, that the attendance on a single day exceeds a hundred thousand visitors representing all classes—young, middle-aged and old. For the care and extension of this branch of our work Commissioner Coleman has fixed upon the sum of \$30,000 as sufficient for the purpose, admits unreservedly that so much is deserved, but warns us that the Board should be made to show exceptionally good results in its expenditure. Why not more? Why not less? Does Commissioner Coleman know how far this sum will go towards maintaining and developing this "great educational institution," as he fittingly describes it? Does he know that the maintenance alone of the collection amounts to more than \$20,000 in its present far from complete condition? Does he know that it is necessary to keep our animals caged and that money is indispensable to keep the cages we now have in repair and provide new ones as accessions are made? Does he remem-

ber, or will he wilfully deny our statement to the Board of Estimate, that, over and above the amount expended for maintenance, and after deducting the sum of \$4,500 to be paid for the Rhinoceros, secured in December last, we have of the \$30,000 allotted to us here by Commissioner Coleman. but \$5,000 in all for the purchase of new specimens and repairing losses to our collection during the coming year. Does Commissioner Coleman know all this, or does he know nothing whatever about it, excepting that he knows, without any knowledge, that he is capable of saving for us, who have the responsibility, and for the people who pay for and rightfully expect the pleasure, just what sum is necessary for the wants of this interesting and educating exhibition. Before leaving this subject, we desire to allude incidentally to the constant care and effort which obtains in this service towards an economical management. Until about a year ago, the subsistence of the carniverous animals consisted altogether of beef purchased at a cost of eight cents a pound, while, during the past year, these animals have been fed entirely on horse meat, slaughtered within our own domain at a maximum cost of two cents a pound, making a saving to the city in this item alone of about \$3,000 a year; and, suggested by this, it is proper to add that the annual cost, per capita, of maintaining the animals in our collection is \$11.25, while the London Zoological Garden expends annually \$19.75 per capita for the same item.

And now we near the end. We have reviewed the report of Commissioner Coleman in the order observed by him. Where his charges have been specific we have refuted them by facts, the simple statement of which has unfolded in proof. Where he has made use of figures we have answered in kind.

His comments on the police show him to be ignorant of alike its necessities and the service it renders. His assertion that political influence supplants discipline, is as reckless as it is untrue. In either and all events, his treatment of this question is unworthy of himself and his office.

Of the museums, not saying much, not much fault can be found with what he says.

In his consideration of music in the parks he mistakes retrenchment for economy; admits the fitness of the custom as a principle, says in effect that the rich and better classes may have concerts but the poor must not, and loses himself completely in a comparison which the press and the public have repeatedly pronounced against all through the season that has passed.

Alluding to the "Harlem River Bridges," he misstates the case, in his interpretation of the intent of the appropriation, pronounces the sum of \$25,000 ample for 1884 and 1885, in spite of the fact that the board of which he is now a member, in at least one of the years cited, increased the amount by its own vote, and, with a wrong premise, as a matter of course, arrives at a wrong conclusion. In the matter of Riverside Park, he prohibits all improvements, conceding to this division barely enough for the ordinary care of its drives and lawns, and the only reason he gives is refuted, at the outset, by the course this Board has invariably followed in presenting their estimates to his.

Referring to Bronx River Bridges, he condemns an appropriation which the law compels him to make, and permits us to expend.

With respect to sewers and drains, he consigns the appropriation to a purpose for which not a dollar of it is used, belittles a work which we have shown to be large and important, and shows his misconception of the nature of the work when he says the appropriation should decrease every year. He repudiates the item of incumbrances altogether, while we have shown it to be indispensable. In his treatment of surveying and laying out he is uncompromisingly unjust, as we have clearly proven by a simple statement of facts and figures that cannot be impeached.

Of the item of Surveys, Maps and Plans there is evidence in what he says that he is not informed at all on the nature of the work discussed. As to the maintenance of parks

he is unreasonable, incorrect and marvellously ignorant. In his comments on the Zoological Gardens he is inconsistent to a degree, for he advocates its extension, and withholds the means necessary to this end, in one and the same breath. And he sums up the whole matter, in an incidental allusion to Mr. Beers of the Council of Municipal Reform, with this, under the circumstances, most remarkable and indisputable truth: "When a charge of fraud, corruption or careless waste is made, it should be made on an incontrovertible statement of facts and figures, and verified in ways positive beyond question of contradiction." Why has he not followed this rule?

It is no new thing for this Department to find itself on the defensive, and this is not the first attack that has been made upon it during the term of the present Board of Commissioners. There is an annual attack that may be expected, because it has so far never failed to come with the regularity of the seasons, but having come to be recognized on all sides as meaningless, it has been allowed to lightwhen annoying, though harmless, has been brushed away. But for the first time now, of late years, comes an attack of different kind—so positive in its charges, both direct and by inference—so grave in its accusations, both stated and implied-so conclusive, if well founded, both of the unfitness and corruption of the office bearers against whom it is directed, and withal from a source, in its official capacity, so responsible—that it demands a much more serious reply than can be compassed through the medium of any To be politically dishonest, in letter that can be written. the scope of the charges now confronting us, is to be dishonest in every sense of the word. If the charges made are true, it is imperative that the present Commissioners of Parks should be removed and still further punished. on the contrary, they have no foundation, it is our right to be vindicated as publicly, as conclusively, as finally as the most thorough and exhaustive enquiry can accomand, to this end, we ask at your hands as the official head of the City, and in such most effective way as you may determine, the fullest and most searching examination into the administration of the Department of Public Parks, during the last year and at the present time, in all its branches and divisions, both as to the expenditure of moneys appropriated to our use and the methods prevailing in the employment and retention of the force under our control, as well as to the efficiency and results of our work. Such an investigation, we are aware, would involve much labor and consume much time: and, mindful of this, we would submit for your consideration the follow-A commission consisting ing proposition: citizens shall be appointed by you for this purpose. proceeding partaking somewhat of a judicial nature, it would seem to be proper that the gentlemen composing the commission should be selected with this in view, and here circumstances seem to favor us in the recent retirement from the bench of Judges Davis and Van Vorst who, with a third man of so high repute as Mr. Wheeler H. Peckham, would make such a tribunal as would result at any rate in getting at the truth, which is all that we or the public can desire. In the event of such an investigation resulting unfavorably to us, we will personally defray all expenses occasioned thereby, including such remuneration to the gentlemen constituting the commission as they themselves shall determine.

In the event only of our complete and unqualified vindication, officially and personally, so far as our personal conduct is concerned in our official relation, the City shall pay all said expenses incurred by the investigation.

If this suggestion meets your approval we shall be satisfied, and it is due to us on every ground, and due to the people of the city as well, that such an investigation should be made forthwith. Wrong-doing should be exposed and condemned. Official wrong-doing is the most pernicious because the most far reaching. But if this is true, it is the last that should be imputed to anyone unless absolutely susceptible of proof. It is easy to charge men in office with neglect or malfeasance. It is too common for the Press, from its strong fortress of power, to pronounce on such charges in an off-hand and

ill-advised and peremptory way, and it is difficult, by any known ordinary process, to obtain redress. Hence it is that many from among our best men can on no account be persuaded to bear their fair share in public affairs. It is a largely accepted belief that to take office is to part on the threshold thereof with one's good name and repute, and it is the great bane and hindrance to our better government that there is too much ground for this belief. When the Press recognize this fact, and when men whose public position gives weight to their words, shall cease to make accusations of a public nature without cause, such a condition of things will in large degree have passed away.

STR:

I am in receipt of your communication of 10th instant, enclosing copies of the records in the matter of laying out and opening One Hundred and Fortieth street, from the Boston road (now Third avenue), to Willis avenue, as a public street or highway, by the Board of Trustees of the late Town of Morrisania, in which you state that assessment lists have been approved for regulating and grading the portion of One Hudred and Fortieth street above referred to, and also for a sewer which has been constructed between Third and Alexander avenues, and that you are directed to ask my opinion as to whether the records in question show that title has been legally acquired by the city to the land over which the portion of the street was thereby laid out.

You further state that nothing has been found on record to support the assertion contained in the preamble on the 4th page of the papers in question that, "the land through "which such street passes * * * had been voluntarily "and in legal form ceded and dedicated to public use as a "street or highway by said owners."

The papers submitted appear to be a copy of a petition of owners of land fronting on the streets in question that the same be legally laid out and opened as a public street or highway, sixty feet wide, as shown on map of sections A and B of North New York, R. Hemwood, Surveyor, dated July 20, 1863. A corporation notice in the matter of laying out and opening said street, that the Board of Trustees of the Town of Morrisania would meet December 15, 1869, to act upon the prayer of said petition, together with

a proof of the publication of the said notice in the Westchester County Journal for three weeks, and a resolution or order of said Board of Trustees reciting the foregoing facts and declaring that said street is legally laid out and opened as a public street or highway, adopted December 15, 1869.

I find nothing in any of the papers furnished me that is equivalent to a cession or grant to the city of title to the land over which the portion of the street in question was thereby laid out. The whole proceeding is a mere dedication to the public use, an acceptance of the same and a formal opening of the street as such. My opinion is that for anything that appears in the papers submitted, the title to the land still remains in the adjacent owners or in other persons, but not in the city.

I herewith return the papers enclosed.
